
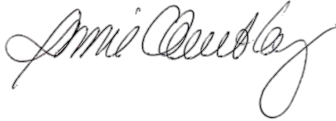

Proposal Title: Portuguese Language Courses and Brazilian Studies Certificate

We are in the process of standardizing the language courses we are offering, including Portuguese courses. First, the Portuguese courses that we currently offer are 4-credit-hour courses but include the same amount of class time as our 3-credit-hour language courses (two periods of 80 minutes). These courses used to include longer class periods, but that is no longer the case. Given the amount of class time and the content covered in these courses, there is no justification for the courses to be considered 4-credit-hour courses. Second, for intermediate-level Portuguese, 3-credit hour courses do exist, but these courses are labeled as intensive and are no longer offered. We propose to teach the intermediate courses we currently offer under these rubrics as regular (not intensive) 3-credit-hour courses. Third, there is no beginner Portuguese course sequence. We propose to create such a course sequence.

The changes we propose to make can be summarized as follows:

- $\emptyset \rightarrow$ PORT 1301 (3 cr.)
- $\emptyset \rightarrow$ PORT 1302 (3 cr.)
- PORT 1402 (4 cr.) $\rightarrow \emptyset$
- PORT 2301 (3 cr.) \rightarrow revise name and description
- PORT 2401 (4 cr.) $\rightarrow \emptyset$
- PORT 2302 (3 cr.) \rightarrow revise name and description
- PORT 2402 (4 cr.) $\rightarrow \emptyset$

These changes will allow us to standardize our offering of Portuguese courses so that they are equivalent to the other lower-level language courses we offer (French, Spanish, Italian, German). The lower number of course credits is also likely to increase enrollment.

In addition to the creation of this course sequence, changes are warranted to increase the number of students who enroll in the Brazilian Studies certificate. That number is currently very low (1-2 new students per year). We propose to count 2 of the 4 Portuguese language courses from the course sequence (i.e., two of PORT 1301, PORT 1302, PORT 2301, and PORT 2302) towards the Brazilian Studies certificate. We also propose to delete Communication courses that seem less relevant to the certificate and add new courses from Chicano Studies, Political Science, Spanish, and Women Studies that seem more relevant as elective courses.

About the Course:

Portuguese 1301 is a beginning Portuguese language course designed for students with no prior experience with the Portuguese language. It emphasizes listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills, all within the cultural context of modern Portuguese-speaking countries, particularly Brazil and Portugal.

To start, emphasis will be given to listening comprehension and oral skills. As the semester moves on all skills will be practiced and developed. The bulk of the material covered will be drawn from the Preliminary Chapter to Chapter 4 of *Ponto de Encontro*.

Upon successful completion of this course students should be able to:

- Comprehend and participate in simple conversations in Portuguese with proper pronunciation and the use of vocabulary and grammar (specially use of present and past tense) on topics related to the daily life such as the classroom, weather, clothes, and time, the family, daily activities, work, etc.
- Read edited materials on familiar topics with an understanding of the main idea and some supporting details.
- Write coherent paragraphs on a familiar topic, such as those listed above, with a logical organization and sufficient accuracy in grammar and spelling to be understood by persons who are used to dealing with students of Portuguese.
- Understand significant traits (lifestyles, attitudes, customs, etc.) of the Portuguese-speaking world, and function appropriately in frequently encountered social situations.

About *My Portuguese Lab*:

My Portuguese Lab is a nationally hosted online learning and assessment system for Portuguese courses. This convenient, easily navigable site offers a wide array of language-learning tools and resources, including powerful voice tools, a flexible grade book, an interactive version of the ***Ponto de Encontro*** Student Activities Manual, an interactive version of the ***Ponto***

de Encontro student text, and all materials from the ***Ponto de Encontro*** audio and video programs.

In ***My Portuguese Lab***, students are recognized as individuals with individual learning needs. For example:

- **Readiness Checks:** At the beginning of each chapter, students may answer questions covering several grammar concepts necessary for understanding the grammar in that chapter. If the Readiness Check indicates they need help on a specific topic, they are referred to appropriate grammar tutorials for the instruction they need.
- **Grammar Tutorials:** Animated tutorials teach students the grammar they need in order to understand the material covered in the text. Other grammar tutorials teach or review the Portuguese grammar topics covered in the course.

Oral Practice

*With **My Portuguese Lab**, students are able to increase their oral proficiency without leaving the online environment. For example:*

- **Audio Recording:** Students can record their voices in response to oral activities from the Student Activities Manual.
- **Audio Feedback:** Instructors can access any or all of the students' recorded audio directly from the course gradebook, then listen, enter a grade, make comments in writing, or record a response in return.
- **Online Oral Communication Tools:** Students can engage in online communication with their classmates, either synchronously or asynchronously through WIMBA.

Class Attendance and Participation:

To expand your proficiency in a language, you must be present in class to engage in active practice. Good attendance is a course requirement. Therefore, if you are absent an excessive number of times during the drop period—from the first day after the end of late registration through the last day for faculty to drop students—your instructor will drop you from the course. Here are the rules:

1. You will be dropped from a class after you've been absent two classes in a row or after you have accumulated a total of six hours of sporadic absences during the semester (equivalent to four absences).
2. Once the last day for faculty to drop students has passed, your instructor cannot drop you, but can and will lower your grade in the course as per the following absence-based table:

3. Late arrivals and early departures also carry penalties. Two late arrivals equal one absence, two early departures equal one absence, and one late arrival plus one early departure equal one absence. If you arrive late to class, it is your responsibility to tell your instructor at the end of the class period that you arrived late but that you were indeed present, for if you do not, it is possible he or she will mark you absent.
4. Exceptions to the above-stated policies are only made under these circumstances: (1) a medical emergency requiring hospitalization, (2) jury duty or (3) official UTEP business such as athletics, debating team, or band. Documentary proof of official UTEP business or jury duty must be provided ten calendar days before the fact; documentary proof of hospitalization must be provided on the day you return to class. Babysitting, work schedule changes, personal problems, unexpected events, or workload are not exceptions for this attendance policy.

Individual Performance Components:

Here are some of the activities you must do during the semester in order to learn the language. You must do this consistently:

- Log in regularly on both platforms [Blackboard](#) and [My Portuguese Lab](#).
- Complete the homework from the My Portuguese Lab or any other assignments given by your instructor.
- Use the Pearson textbook and the online exercises to review material covered and prepare for the next class.
- Complete all assignments, module assessments, etc. on time. Do not wait until the day before but rather start assignments with sufficient time.
- Make good use of writing assignments (in compositions and online exercises)—these are opportunities when you can challenge yourself to express complex ideas, write complex sentences, and utilize a diverse range of vocabulary.
- Have a good knowledge of the vocabulary studied in the course; review past vocabulary as much as necessary to master it.
- When in class, do your best to work effectively and productively with other students. You should make every effort to only communicate in Portuguese. Excessive use of English or Spanish in class will lower your participation grade.
- When outside of class, look for opportunities to speak, listen and write the language every day, including with family or friends. Take advantage of the Brazilian Cultural Center!
- Have confidence in your ability to use the language to express your ideas on a subject.

About Late Work:

Due dates for every assignment are provided on the course calendar located in My Portuguese Lab. Unless otherwise stated, assignments are due on those days. Be sure to **record the dates on your own calendar and make it a top priority to adhere to them as no late work is accepted.**

Because projects are a key component which serve to demonstrate your understanding of the Portuguese language (60% of your grade) know that **without successful completion of all the assigned My Portuguese Lab activities per unit, no projects will be accepted.** Completion of assigned activities with a passing grade (of at least a 70) per unit is required before submitting a project.

Note: If you experience extenuating circumstances (e.g., you are hospitalized) that prohibit you from submitting your work on time, please let me know as soon as possible. I will evaluate these instances on a case-by-case basis.

Portuguese 1302 is a continuation of Portuguese 1301 with the introduction of more complex elements of grammar; additional practice in the four basic skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing, all within the cultural context of modern Portuguese-speaking countries, particularly Brazil and Portugal. The bulk of the material covered will be drawn from Chapter 5 to Chapter 10 of *Ponto de Encontro*.

You may be admitted to Portuguese 1302 only if you have taken Portuguese 1301 at UTEP or the equivalent at other higher education institution.

2. Once the last day for faculty to drop students has passed, your instructor cannot drop you, but can and will lower your grade in the course as per the following absence-based table:

<u>Total unexcused absences</u>	<u>Points by which your course grade will be lowered</u>
4 absences	2 points
5 absences	4 points
6 absences	6 points
7 absences	8 points

3. Late arrivals and early departures also carry penalties. Two late arrivals equal one absence, two early departures equal one absence, and one late arrival plus one early departure equal one absence. If you arrive late to class, it is your responsibility to tell your instructor at the end of the class period that you arrived late but that you were indeed present, for if you do not, it is possible he or she will mark you absent.
4. Exceptions to the above-stated policies are only made under these circumstances: (1) a medical emergency requiring hospitalization, (2) jury duty or (3) official UTEP business such as athletics, debating team, or band. Documentary proof of official UTEP business or jury duty must be provided ten calendar days before the fact; documentary proof of hospitalization must be provided on the day you return to class. Babysitting, work schedule changes, personal problems, unexpected events, or workload are not exceptions for this attendance policy.

Individual Performance Components:

Here are some of the activities you must do during the semester in order to learn the language. You must do this consistently:

1. Participation: Participation in class is crucial for individual learning and for the success of the class as a whole. In order to encourage your active participation in class, I will assign you a participation grade out of 10 possible points using the following criteria:

- i. You communicate in Portuguese whenever possible with your professor and classmates from the moment you walk in until you leave class.
- ii. You are ready to begin class on time.
- iii. You are well prepared for class by demonstrating that you have put in some hours outside of class.
- iv. You always submit complete homework assignments.
- v. You participate actively in all class activities, especially group or pair work.

2. Weekly Homework: A set of weekly assignments in *Caderno de Produção* is due (almost) every Monday.

3. Compositions: Total of **two**. Each of those will be a one-page essay. More information about dates and topics will be provided during the semester. You are

expected to submit your assignments on time. As a general rule, no late work will be accepted.

- 4. Quizzes and exams:** No make-up quizzes or exams will be given. Permission to make up a quiz or exam will only be granted in cases of illness or family emergencies. In case of illness, a doctor's note is required. Students who must be away from the university due to performance, athletic, or religious responsibilities on the date of a quiz or exam must arrange to take the quiz/exam **in advance**.
- 5. Oral Exam:** There will be **one** oral exam during the semester at the end of the first half. On that occasion, you will be interviewed individually (during professor's office hours) and asked simple questions we will have covered in class together.
- 6. Final Project:** The final project for this class is a 15-minute **oral presentation**. It will give you an opportunity to express your own ideas, explore using the language, and put together all the different skills that you have acquired in the course. More information about dates and topics for the presentation will be provided during the semester.

*** Keep in mind that as your instructor, I am here to help. If you have questions or feel like you might need extra help with any material or skills, talk to me first about the best thing to do. ***

About Late Work:

Due dates for every assignment are provided on the course calendar. Unless otherwise stated, assignments are due on those days. Be sure to **record the dates on your own calendar and make it a top priority to adhere to them as no late work is accepted**.

If you experience extenuating circumstances (e.g., you are hospitalized) that prohibit you from submitting your work on time, please let me know as soon as possible. I will evaluate these instances on a case-by-case basis.

"Copying from the test paper of another student, engaging in written, oral, or any other means of communication with another student during a test, or giving aid to or seeking aid from another student during a test; possession and/or use during a test of materials which are not authorized by the person giving the test, such as class notes, books, or specifically designed "crib notes"; using, obtaining, or attempting to obtain by any means the whole or any part of non-administered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program; using a test that has been administered in prior classes or semesters but which will be used again either in whole or in part without permission of the instructor; or accessing a test bank without instructor permission; collaborating with or seeking aid from another student for an assignment without authority; substituting for another person, or permitting another person to substitute for one's self, to take a test; and falsifying research data, laboratory reports, and/or other records or academic work offered for credit."

b. Plagiarism:

"Means the appropriation, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means another's work and the unacknowledged submission or incorporation of it in one's own academic work offered for credit, or using work in a paper or assignment for which the student had received credit in another course without direct permission of all involved instructors."

c. Collusion:

"Means the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing academic assignments offered for credit or collaboration with another person to commit a violation of any provision of the rules on scholastic dishonesty."

Undergraduate Certificate in Brazilian Studies

Students who want to be more competitive in the global workforce are welcome to take this certificate. A certificate in Brazilian Studies is a logical complement to some of our existing minors. This certificate includes courses in Portuguese language and in Brazilian Culture, Literature, and Film offered in the Department of [Languages-Latin-US](#) and Linguistics as well as in other departments such as Art, Sociology and Anthropology, Communication, History, Political Sciences, African American Studies, and [the Center for Inter-American and Border Studies](#) in the College of Liberal Arts; as well as courses in the College of Education. Some of these courses already focus on Brazil, while others have or can add a component on Brazil.

The certificate consists of 15 credit hours, with ~~one-two of four required Portuguese language courses~~ and -PORT 3340: Introduction to Brazilian Cultures ~~as required courses~~. The remaining ~~4-2~~ courses should be taken in at least ~~3-2~~ of the participating departments. Students will be required to maintain a minimum B average in certificate courses. Students may substitute one of these courses for a study abroad experience in Brazil offered by a certified academic program.

~~Students must have completed Portuguese 1402, 2401 and 2402 (or equivalent) with a grade of C or better to begin the certificate in Brazilian Studies. To complete-obtain this interdisciplinary certificate, students must have completed 15 credits in courses approved for the certificate, with a grade of B or better. PORT 3340 Cultures of Brazil is required. The other four courses should be taken in at least three of the participating departments.~~
Students should consult with ~~Dr. Debora Zamorano the Director of Brazilian Studies~~ to determine a course of study suitable to their interests and before enrolling in courses that do not deal specifically with Brazil but that do contain a Brazilian component.- These courses are designated with an *.

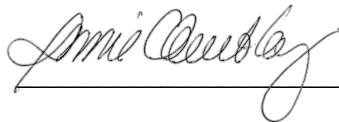
