Proposal Title: Spanish Major with Concentrations

Our number of Spanish majors has come down from 72 in 2018 to 26 in 2023. This is due in part to the limited workplace applications of the current Spanish major. With the advent of COVID and the subsequent economic inflation, UTEP students are increasingly seeking degree plans that have practical applications for the workplace. We are proposing to redesign our Spanish major with this goal in mind.

Our proposed Spanish major follows a concentration model, similarly to Spanish majors offered at other institutions (e.g., University of Arizona). Students who complete the proposed Spanish major do a common set of courses that provide the foundation needed to complete the more advanced courses targeted by the different concentrations. The common set of courses (12 credits) are:

- CHIC 2311 Introduction to Chicano Studies
- LING 2320 Introduction to Linguistics
- SPAN 3300 Critical Analyses of Hispanic Literature and Culture
- SPAN 3357 Advanced Spanish Composition

These four required courses make the proposed Spanish major interdisciplinary and thus attractive, and they will help us recruit students from the different areas targeted by the courses. Students then choose 3 additional Spanish courses from two lists of courses (9 credits). The total number of credit hours for common courses that students take across concentrations is 21.

Students then select 1 of 4 concentrations (15 credits each). The proposed concentrations are:

- 1. Translation and Interpreting
- 2. Applied Linguistics
- 3. Chicano Studies
- Literature and Culture

The first two concentrations have practical applications for the workplace: The first concentration is useful for students who want to work in translation and interpreting, and the second concentration is useful for students who want to teach Spanish. The second and third concentrations make double majoring easier, because we also offer majors in Linguistics and Bilingualism (proposed name under consideration) and in Chicano Studies, and students can double-fulfill and count the concentration courses towards their second major. The fourth concentration is in line with the more advanced Spanish courses that we currently offer, and thus students pursuing this fourth concentration would end up with a major that is somewhat similar to the Spanish major that we currently offer.

Students pursuing the proposed Spanish major would need to select a minor, and this minor could not be the same as the selected concentration. For example, students pursuing a Spanish major with a concentration in Translation and Interpreting would not be able to also minor in Translation and Interpreting. Similarly, students pursuing a Spanish major with a concentration in Applied Linguistics would not be able to also minor in Linguistics and Bilingualism, but they could double-major in Linguistics and Bilingualism. Likewise, Students pursuing a Spanish major with a concentration in Chicano Studies could not pursue a Chicano Studies minor, but they could double-major in Chicano Studies. In fact, we anticipate that our proposed major will make double majoring much easier for students since courses that count toward the concentrations can also count toward the second major. As such, the proposed Spanish major is more likely to attract students than the current Spanish major. Students who double major in Spanish and either Linguistics and Bilingualism or Chicano Studies would not be required to complete a minor.

Because we already offer all the courses listed under the different concentrations (as part of our Translation and Interpreting minor, as part of our Linguistics and Bilingualism major/minor, as part of our Chicano Studies major/minor, and as part of our current Spanish major/minor), the proposed concentrations do not add to our current course offering. Yet, they allow students to make the most out of a Spanish major given the practical applications of two of the four concentrations and the easy double majoring with two of them, and they will help us reverse the decreasing trend observed in our number of Spanish majors.

The proposed degree changes increase the number of credit hours for the Spanish major from 27 to 36. This change is necessary to keep enough Spanish courses in the Spanish major while also allowing students to pursue different concentrations. Since two courses within the major (LING 2320 and SPAN 2340) also count as University core courses, and since students can now count Spanish language courses towards both the major and the foreign language requirement (recent curriculum change that was approved at the College and University levels), we do not anticipate that the increase in credit hours will delay student graduations.

In addition to these changes, we propose a number of course name and course description changes for Spanish courses. These changes better reflect how the courses are currently taught.

We believe that the proposed changes will result in a marked increase in the number of students who major in Spanish.
