When a business practices business continuity, it becomes resilient since business continuity picks up where risk management fails. The principles of business continuity are easily applied to government and non-profit management. Business continuity faces the same challenges that government administration does: leadership buy-in and budget allocation. Every facet of a community needs to be continuous in the face of disasters. Every facet of a community needs to be resilient so they can show up and provide services so the whole (not just individual parts) can recover more quickly and with less pain.

Congratulations on earning the Army Congressional Fellowship!

What is the Army Congressional Fellowship Program?

The Army Congressional Fellowship is a 44-month program that includes pursuit of a Master of Professional Studies (MPS) Degree in Legislative Affairs at George Washington University starting on 3 APR 23, then service as a Fellow for a Member of Congress on 3 JAN 2024, and utilization on the Army Staff in a congressional-related duty position. I will be serving os a Member of Congress personal staff on Capitol Hill. My duties will include drafting legislation, preparing and staffing the Member for congressional hearings, writing speeches, drafting floor statements, handling defenserelated constituent issues, and briefing Members of Congress prior to committee meetings and floor debate.

What is your job title?

Currently, I am the Chief Medical Non-commissioned Officer at the Dwight D. Eisenhower Army Medical Center in Fort Gordon, GA, which has three outlying health clinics--Camp Shelby, MS, SOUTHCOM Clinic, Miami FL, and Rodriguez Army Health Clinic, Ft. Buchanan, PR-- providing 5-star healthcare to more than 64,000 beneficiaries.

What is your favorite thing about the MPA Program?

My favorite thing about the MPA program is that it is designed for those who are committed to leadership development in the public and nonprofit sectors. It will provide the business and financial expertise as well as the understanding of policy and power dynamics to serve in a high-level position on Capitol Hill.

What inspired you to pursue your MPA degree?

I was inspired to pursue my MPA degree by my passion to serve in public service and leadership in future public, private, and nonprofit sectors.

How has your MPA degree helped you in your career?

My MPA degree helped me in my career by increasing the value I give to my team and the beneficiaries I serve in my current position. It also helped me prepare for future government work on Capitol Hill.

What advice would you give to incoming students?

My advice to incoming students is to stay focused, resilient, and fulfil your goals. The MPA program enabled me to develop my leadership skills, collaborate with talented people, study a wide range of topics, spearhead work on important issues, and provide many career opportunities as evident by my selection for the Army Congressional Fellowship.
