A. Personal Statement

As a heath disparities scholar and researcher with an interest in developing education interventions to improve cancer screening and prevention in underserved and minority populations, my work seeks to design community-based interventions using social determinants and ecological model strategies to address cancer and health inequalities found among Hispanic populations. I have the expertise, leadership, academic training in health disparities and equity and motivation to carry out the proposed research project. I have worked to address the burden of social and health inequalities in minority populations in the U.S.-Mexico Border for the past 34 years, primarily in a multi and interdisciplinary fashion. My research includes health disparities; community based participatory research, social work macro practice approaches, use of Photovoice method, HPV and Latinos. I am an associate professor in the Department of Social Work at the University of Texas at El Paso. I conduct community-engaged scholarship initiatives focused on high impact practices in education, homelessness and interdisciplinary education, therefore I am well suited to lead the HPV Across the Lifespan behavioral project. I have experience working with faculty and students as well as community partners in the areas of gualitative research, educational interventions and training of community health workers. With support from a R01 grant to Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, I am a co-PI in El Paso where I am currently managing a research project seeking to increase utilization of the HPV vaccine. I have successfully administered research projects, collaborated with other scholars and researchers, and produced several peer-review publications from each project. C. Contributions to Science

My interest in the Hispanic and Latino populations in the United States comes from multiple sources, including my background. I have witnesses the lack of understanding among health and human services programs and providers, policies and projects about the diversity within the Latino population in the United States. The implications of the growth of the Latino population in the US has great implications for health research.

1. Photovoice methodologies as participatory action research

I have developed a niche specialty in qualitative research including Photovoice, a method grounded in Feminist Theory, Freire's critical consciousness theory and the power of documentary photography. Photovoice is a participatory action method that captures people's stories through photographs and

stories. I have applied Photovoice in the content areas of stigma and tuberculosis, HIV/AIDS, diabetes, IPV, sexual and reproductive health, and homelessness. My use of the Photovoice method has led to seven peer-reviewed publications and national and international recognition. I have trained or provided technical assistance in the use of the Photovoice method to more than 120 professionals and students in the United States, Panama, Mexico, the Philippines, Kenya, and Brazil. 2. Knowledge, Attitudes and Practices in Tuberculosis

TB: *Knowledge, Attitudes and Practices (KAP) in Tuberculosis in Mexico.* The goal of the Mexico KAP TB Study was to investigate knowledge, attitudes and practices in five Mexican communities. The research design involved a multi-site sample frame among 1,250 households, 250 health professionals, 250 persons living with TB, and 150 caregivers. The questionnaire incorporated the TB stigma scale that I had validated during my dissertation. Health care professionals and people with the TB disease in Mexico.

3. Nuestra Casa Initiative: TB and HIV Disparities in the U.S.-Mexico Border Region

The goal of the Nuestra Casa project was to generate knowledge concerning the role of social stigma in the treatment of TB and HIV. The qualitative research design was informed by the work of photographer Damien Schuman and based on Photovoice principles. Project activities were conducted in six locations, two in the U.S. and four in Mexico. The project was carried out through collaboration among the Mexico Ministry of Health, the U.S. CDC, and four U.S. state health department TB programs. Content analysis was used to generate themes addressing how to mitigate stigma. In El Paso, the project mobilized UTEP faculty, staff, students, and community organizations. Funding was secured from USAID to launch activities in Mexico and from UTEP's President Office to support campus-based activities. Outcomes from Nuestra Casa include two peer-reviewed articles published .Nuestra Casa received the 2013 south region Magrath Award on Community-Academic Engagement.

4. The Sexual and Reproductive Health of Mexican Migrant Women in CD. Juárez, Guadalajara, Mexico, and El Paso, Texas. The goal of this study was to explore the sexual and reproductive health needs of migrant Mexican women of reproductive age. The study was conducted through an interdisciplinary partnership between UTEP, Universidad de Guadalajara, CASS in Guadalajara. Study methods involved in-depth interviews with ninety Mexican migrant women and 45 key informant, community leaders. Researchers trained local community members to conduct interviews with migrants and key informants to identify sexual and reproductive health needs. Findings were published in the following venue. 5. Addressing Health and Social Consequences of Intimate Partner Violence

This study was related to an earlier research project: *The Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) of Mexican Migrant Women in CD. Juárez, Guadalajara, México, and El Paso, Texas.* The goal of the study was to explore the effects of migration on gender, intimate partner violence (IPV), and sexual and reproductive health among residents living El Paso, Texas. The study used qualitative methods including focus groups. The research was funded through a P20 grant from the NIH/National Center for Minority Health and Health Disparities. Study findings were used to develop culturally and linguistically competent educational modules for community health workers. Two bilingual training modules were created and then used to train forty CHWs who were subsequently State licensed.
