FRESHMAN

- Review your Department of Art degree plan to familiarize yourself with the University core requirements.
- Complete the Art Foundations block, and note that 3 of these credit hours fulfill the University core's Creative Arts requirement.
- Take core courses, including RWS 1301/1302 and HIST 1301/1302.
- Examine the options for your core Math requirement.

- Contact the Department of Art Student Advisor, Terri Bauer, before registration.
- Talk with DoART faculty about career opportunities in the field.
- Visit the Academic Advising Center for language placement in Spanish or French. All other languages do not require placement.

- Ask the Department of Art Student Advisor about study away opportunities and about joining a learning community.
- Explore student organizations such as Art History Association, Maximo Art Society, the Ceramic Art Students Association, UTEP Jewelry and Metals and the Sculpture Collective.
- Engage with your field by attending visiting-artist workshops and lectures.

- Discover tutoring resources, such as the University Writing Center and the Math Resource Center for Students.
- Cultivate healthy lifestyle habits by visiting the Student Recreation Center.
- Submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- Visit the University Career Center and begin developing your resume or CV.
- Familiarize yourself with the Stanlee & Gerald Ruben Center for the Visual Arts.

SOPHOMORE

- Begin taking courses for your language requirement.
- Consult your Department of Art degree plan.
- Complete your remaining core classes.
- Begin your Major Concentration by selecting classes from one or two of the following studio concentrations: Ceramics, Drawing, Graphic Design, Painting, Metals, Printmaking, or Sculpture.

- Meet with the DoART Student Advisor, Terri Bauer, before registration.
- Discuss minor options with the DoART Student Advisor.
- Talk with DoART faculty about career opportunities in the field.

- Discover community-involvement opportunities in your field through the Center for Civic Engagement.
- Cultivate leadership roles in your DoART student organizations.
- Explore the world with a Study Abroad course.
- Check your UTEP email inbox and visit the Department of Art website for updates on DoART events.

- Network at employer recruitment activities with JobMine.
- Join the Liberal Arts Honors Program.
- Identify scholarship opportunities through the DoART Scholarship Coordinator, Kim Bauer, and the Office of Scholarships.

JUNIOR

- Select a non-studio minor inside or outside the Department of Art.
- Consult your DoART degree plan.
- Continue concentration studio course work.

- Meet with the DoART Student Advisor, Terri Bauer, before registration.
- Discuss concentration-specific internship and study away opportunities with the DoART Student Advisor.
- Visit the College of Liberal Arts Student Success Center once you reach 90 hours for a review of your degree plan.
- Talk with DoART faculty about career opportunities in the field.

- Talk with DoART faculty about symposium and conference opportunities that align with your interests.
- Apply for the Annual Juried UTEP Student Art Exhibition.
- Exhibit your work at The Glass Gallery.
- Expand your leadership activities in your DoART student organizations.
- Represent the Department of Art through UTEP's Miner Ambassadors Program.
- Build on your community engagement efforts by participating in Project MOVE.

- Identify opportunities for graduate or professional study, working closely with faculty to align programs with your desired career path.

SENIOR

- Complete your major requirements. You must have 24 credit hours at the 3000/4000 level, and you must have 120 total credit hours to graduate.
- Complete your minor requirements. You must complete 18 hours of minor coursework, and at least 9 of those hours must be upper division.
- Consult your DoART degree plan as you complete the requirements for your Bachelor of Arts in Art.

- Review your graduation audit with the Graduation Director.

Welcome to UTEP College of Liberal Arts

With nearly 7,000 students, the College of Liberal Arts is the largest college on the UTEP campus, with degree programs in the visual and performing arts, the humanities and the social sciences. The college also provides most of the UTEP core curriculum to students in all colleges. Excellence is found throughout the college's programs, from its online bilingual M.F.A. in Creative Writing – the first of its kind in the country – to its doctoral degrees in Borderlands History, Rhetoric and Composition, and Psychology. Faculty engages in interdisciplinary research in Hispanic health disparities, social justice, border studies and environmental communication. The Patricia and Paul Yetter Law School Preparation Institute, a program that helps prepare UTEP students for law school, is nationally known for its success. In several degree programs, students have the opportunity to enroll in internships, which provide valuable experience in their areas of interest. Students also benefit from an increasing number of study abroad opportunities, including courses taught by college faculty in Rome, London and Seville, Spain. The college's new honors program began in 2012 with a variety of academic enrichment components and an honors minor.
