



FRESHMAN

YOUR CLASS SCHEDULE

- Review core requirements.
- Take core courses, including RWS 1301, Rhetoric and Composition 1, and ENGL 1313, Writing About Literature.
- Examine the options for your core Math requirement, including MATH 1319.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

- Meet with your Academic Advising Center advisor before registration.
- Visit the Academic Advising Center for a language placement exam.

ENRICHING EXPERIENCES

- Ask your advisor about joining a learning community.
- Explore student organizations and seek out leadership-development activities.
- Engage with your field by attending presentations in the Department Reading Series, including the Dishonest Mailman Reading Series.
- Support your community by sharing poetry at local schools. Contact the department about reaching out to schools.

LIFELONG SUCCESS

- Discover tutoring resources, such as the University Writing Center and the Math Resource Center for Students.
- Cultivate healthy lifestyle habits by visiting the Student Recreation Center.
- Submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- Visit the University Career Center and begin developing your resume or CV.

SOPHOMORE

- Take CRW 3362, Introduction to Creative Writing, and CRW 3363, Foundational Techniques, during the second semester of your sophomore year.
- Begin taking courses for your language requirement.
- Review core requirements.
- Select a complementary minor. Consider diverse interdisciplinary options such as English, Spanish, French, Philosophy, and History.

- Schedule an appointment early to meet with your Academic Advising Center advisor before registration.
- Ask your advisor about the benefits of Study Abroad courses.
- Discuss minor options with your advisor.
- Reach out to the LSPI if you are considering law school, particularly if you are minoring in Legal Reasoning.

- Explore the world with a Study Abroad course.
- Discover community engagement opportunities through the Center for Civic Engagement.
- Continue to engage with your field by attending presentations in the Department Reading Series, including the Dishonest Mailman Reading Series.

- Network at employer recruitment activities with JobMine.
- Join the Liberal Arts Honors Program.
- Represent your College through the Liberal Arts Ambassadors Program.
- Identify scholarship opportunities through the Office of Scholarships.

JUNIOR

- Take a total of five courses selected from the Junior-Senior Block categories, beginning in junior year, after pre-requisite sites are fulfilled. No more than two courses may be taken in a single category.
- Take minor courses and complete your language requirement.

- Meet with the Creative Writing Department advisor once you reach 60 hours. Department advising is available on a walk-in basis or by appointment at crwundergrad@utep.edu.
- Reach out to the LSPI if you are considering law school, particularly if you are minoring in Legal Reasoning.
- Visit the College of Liberal Arts Student Success Center once you reach 90 hours for a review of your degree plan.

- Submit a panel discussion proposal to the annual conference of the Association of Writers & Writing Programs (AWP). Consult faculty mentors about additional conference opportunities.
- Participate in diverse community writing workshops and reading series, such as the Barrio Writers summer writing program, Tumblewords Project, and The Barbed Wire Open Mic Series.
- Discover community literary events and venues such as the EPCC Literary Fiesta and Literarity Book Shop.
- Explore the world with a Study Abroad course.
- Build on your community-engagement efforts by participating in Project MOVE.
- Continue to engage with your field by attending presentations in the Department Reading Series, including the Dishonest Mailman Reading Series.

- Identify opportunities for graduate or professional study. Note application deadlines and begin preparing for required exams.
- Visit the University Career Center and continue developing your resume/CV.
- Cultivate professional relationships with faculty mentors in anticipation of securing letters of recommendation for graduate and employment applications.
- Research publishing companies, literary journals, and Creative Writing community organizations. Consult faculty mentors about post-graduate opportunities.

SENIOR

- Take CRW 4305, Senior Seminar, during the Spring semester of your senior year.
- Complete your major and minor requirements. You must have 24 credit hours at the 3000/4000 level, and you must have 120 total credit hours to graduate.
- Review the Creative Writing major requirements.

- Meet with the Creative Writing Department advisor before registration. Department advising is available on a walk-in basis or by appointment at crwundergrad@utep.edu.
- Review your graduation audit with the Graduation Director.

- Submit a panel discussion proposal to the annual conference of the Association of Writers & Writing Programs (AWP). Consult faculty mentors about additional conference opportunities.

With nearly 7,000 students, the College of Liberal Arts is the largest college on the UTEP campus, with degree programs in the visual and performing arts, the humanities and the social sciences. The college also provides most of the UTEP core curriculum to students in all colleges.
