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


C4FE Public Speaker Program

C4FE Political Economy Reading Group

The Center for Free Enterprise expanded its popular political economy reading group, demonstrating the program's growing appeal among students seeking deeper engagement with economic and political thought. By hosting two groups each semester, the Center accommodated increased student interest while maintaining the intimate, discussionbased format that makes these sessions so effective for learning.

Center Director Nicolas Cachanosky and faculty member Louis Rouanet served as discussion leaders, bringing their extensive expertise in political economy to guide thoughtful conversations. This faculty-led approach ensures that students receive expert guidance while exploring complex economic theories and their contemporary applications.

The reading group provides students with exposure to both foundational and cutting-edge scholarship in political economy. Students read and discussed classic authors such as Frédéric Bastiat, Ludwig von Mises, Friedrich A. Hayek, and Milton Friedman, gaining deep familiarity with the intellectual foundations of free market economics and classical liberalism. The reading selection also included contemporary work by scholars such as Jason Brennan, G. A. Cohen, and Lawrence H. White, ensuring that students engage with ongoing debates and modern developments in the field.

This diverse curriculum challenges students to think critically about economic systems, political philosophy, and the relationship between individual liberty and social organization, preparing them for advanced study and informed civic participation.

The Laissez-Faire Political Economy Club

A dynamic new student organization, the Laissez-Faire Political Economy Club (LFPEC), was launched with the support of the Center for Free Enterprise. This student-led initiative demonstrates the growing interest among UTEP students in exploring free market principles and classical liberal thought through active discussion and real-world applications.

LFPEC had a remarkably active inaugural year, hosting a total of seven events during the Spring 2025 semester. The club's ambitious programming reflects the enthusiasm of its student members, who created meaningful learning opportunities that complement their academic studies while fostering intellectual curiosity about economic freedom.

The organization attracted an impressive roster of speakers from diverse sectors, bridging theory and practice in economic education. Their guest speakers included Elisa Morales (Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas), Nicolas Cachanosky (Center for Free Enterprise), Ana Gutierrez Zubiate (Hunt Institute), and Paul Dipp (Economy Wholesale Grocers). LFPEC also hosted the Mayor of El Paso, Renard U. Johnson, among other distinguished speakers, demonstrating the club's ability to engage with local leadership and connect academic theory with practical governance challenges.



Teaching Economic Freedom

The Center for Free Enterprise continued its partnership with the Bridwell Institute for Economic Freedom by offering the Teaching Economic Freedom program in El Paso. This initiative extends economic education beyond the university level, ensuring that foundational economic principles reach students at the high school level.

The program provides economic training workshops to all El Paso high school instructors through a strategic collaboration with Education Service Center Region 19 (ESC19). These workshops equip educators with the tools and pedagogical approaches necessary to make economics engaging and accessible for high school students.

During the 2024-25 academic year, the Center expanded its educational outreach by providing specialized training on personal financial literacy to both local high school instructors and student parents. This dual approach creates a comprehensive support system for student learning, reinforcing financial education both in the classroom and at home.

The program's impact extends beyond individual participants, as trained educators return to their classrooms better equipped to prepare students for informed economic decisionmaking and civic participation, helping build a more economically literate community throughout the El Paso region.

Freedom Perspectives

In collaboration with the Friedman-Hayek Center for the Study of a Free Society at Universidad del CEMA in Argentina, the Center for Free Enterprise co-organizes a webinar series featuring leading scholars exploring the broad tradition of classical liberalism. This international partnership demonstrates the Center's commitment to fostering global academic dialogue in political economy.

The webinar series provides a platform for examining classical liberal thought through contemporary lenses, addressing current challenges facing free societies while drawing on the rich intellectual heritage of liberal philosophy and economics. By leveraging digital technology, the collaboration transcends geographical boundaries, enabling participants from multiple continents to engage in meaningful scholarly discourse.

The series hosted eleven meetings with a total attendance of 411, demonstrating strong international interest in classical liberal ideas among scholars, students, policymakers, and engaged citizens. The presentations feature distinguished academics who bring diverse perspectives to fundamental questions about liberty, economic freedom, and the role of government in society.




The Latin American Left-Leaning Populism Index

The Center for Free Enterprise is proud to announce the development of the Latin American Left-Leaning Populism Index, a pioneering research tool that represents a significant advancement in the study of populism and political economy in the region. This comprehensive index distinguishes itself as a unique contribution to academic scholarship by examining not only populist rhetoric—the traditional focus of most populism studies but also the actual implementation of populist policies across Latin American governments.

The index provides an opportunity for the Center for Free Enterprise to establish itself as a major contributor to both political economy research and Latin American political studies. By developing this innovative analytical framework, the Center positions itself at the forefront of contemporary debates about democratic governance, economic policy, and political representation in one of the world's most dynamic regions.

Covering 21 countries over a 19-year period, this extensive dataset offers researchers, policymakers, and analysts a robust foundation for understanding the evolution and impact of left-leaning populist movements throughout Latin America. The comprehensive scope and longitudinal design of the index enable detailed comparative analysis and the identification of regional trends that have previously been difficult to quantify and study systematically.

This groundbreaking research tool promises to enhance our understanding of how populist movements translate campaign promises into governing realities, providing valuable insights for scholars, policymakers, and citizens interested in the relationship between political rhetoric and policy outcomes.





C4FE Economic Insights

The C4FE Economic Insights publication has emerged as one of the Center for Free Enterprise's most successful outreach initiatives, demonstrating our commitment to making economic scholarship accessible to broader audiences. This monthly publication bridges the gap between academic research and public understanding by presenting current policy and economic events in clear, engaging language that serves both the university community and the general public.

The C4FE Economic Insights represents a collaborative effort that showcases the Center's educational mission in action. The program is run by the Center's research assistants under the careful supervision of the Center's director and faculty, providing students with valuable experience in economic analysis, writing, and publication while ensuring the highest standards of scholarly integrity.
