<b>GROUNDCOVERS</b>				
Groundcover	<i>Aptenia cordifolia</i>	<a href="#">Hearts and Flowers</a>	1 gal	The succulent stems will root wherever they are in contact with moist soil, which makes this low growing groundcover a wonderful addition to rock gardens, slopes, and containers of any size. It works beautifully in hanging baskets as well, growing quickly with minimal watering whether placed in full sun or shade.
Groundcover	<i>Callirhoe involucrata</i>	<a href="#">Winecups</a>	1 gal	Its stems spread out about three feet from the base and under a foot tall. The flowers are chalice-shaped (thus the name Winecup) and are about 1.5-2.5 inches in diameter
Groundcover	<i>Dalea capitata</i>	<a href="#">Lemon dalea</a>	5 gal	This durable, semi-deciduous groundcover has bright green, fine-textured, aromatic foliage. Small yellow flower spikes carpet Sierra Gold® in the spring and fall.
Groundcover	<i>Dalea greggii</i>	<a href="#">Trailing Indigo Bush</a>	5 gal	This low-growing evergreen has the ability to form roots wherever its stems touch the ground, making it an excellent soil stabilizer and enabling it to rapidly spread 6-8 feet or more while maintaining a mounding height of only 2 feet. In spring, small purple blossoms appear in abundance, attracting butterflies to your garden.
Groundcover	<i>Dichondra argentea</i>	<a href="#">Silver Ponyfoot</a>	1 gal	This knockout herbaceous perennial is evergreen, with soft, rounded silver leaves that look like pewter. Although not especially cold hardy (to 20-25° F), it is fast-growing and is a popular annual in colder climates.
Groundcover	<i>Drosanthemum speciosum 'Rosea'</i>	<a href="#">Rose Iceplant</a>	1 gal	This groundcover forms a dense, flat mat of small, sparkly succulent green leaves. Shocking pink-purple blooms cover this plant from mid-spring to summer
Groundcover	<i>Gazania rigens 'Sun Gold'</i>	<a href="#">Gazania 'Sun Gold'</a>	1 gal	This trailing evergreen groundcover forms a dense mound of gray, fuzzy leaves, with bright yellow daisy-like flowers held above the foliage

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Groundcover	<i>Glandularia pulchella</i>	<a href="#">Rock Verbena</a>	1 gal	Masses of purple flowers adorn this perennial groundcover from spring through fall.
Groundcover	<i>Lantana montevidensis</i>	<a href="#">Purple Trailing Lantana</a>	1 gal	This tough native of South America quickly forms a low mounding groundcover with dark green, aromatic, rough-textured foliage.
Groundcover	<i>Lantana montevidensis</i> 'white'	<a href="#">White Trailing Lantana</a>	1 gal	This white flowering variety of trailing lantana performs much like the purple except for flower color. Plants will mound up to 2 feet tall and 5 feet wide. Clusters of white flowers are produced all through the warm season.
Groundcover	<i>Lantana</i> 'new gold'	<a href="#">New Gold Lantana</a>	1 gal	This semi-evergreen groundcover forms a dense, compact mound of dark green foliage. Masses of bright gold flowers cover the plant throughout the warm months. This plant tolerates full sun, reflected heat, smog, poor soil and drought.
Groundcover	<i>Malephora lutea</i>	<a href="#">Rocky Point Iceplant</a>	1 gal	Collected from a yard in Rocky Point, Mexico, this groundcover has succulent, bright green leaves that provide a lush backdrop for yellow daisy-like flowers.
Groundcover	<i>Teucrium chamedrys</i> 'Prostratum'	<a href="#">Prostrate Germander</a>	1 gal	This prostrate, dense, mounding perennial is native to the Mediterranean. Small, leathery dark green leaves are accented in the spring and summer by short spikes of lavender flowers.
<b>VINES</b>				
Vine	<i>Bignonia capreolata</i>	<a href="#">Tangerine Crossvine</a>	5 gal	We have this American native to furnish our arbors and trellises with year-round lustrous green color that is accented by purple hues in winter and clusters of hummingbird-attracting orange trumpets in spring. Since it doesn't typically defoliate in the winter, this vigorous and hardy vine makes an excellent privacy screen when grown along fences, and helps to absorb heat and block reflected sun when grown against a wall.

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Vine	<i>Callaeum macropterum (Mascagnia macroptera)</i>	<a href="#">Yellow Orchid Vine</a>	5 gal	Bright yellow, orchid-like flowers adorn the plant in spring and summer. If not supported, this plant will twine on itself to produce a mounding shrub or even a groundcover. This plant is fairly drought tolerant once established, but will appear more lush with regular summer watering.
Vine	<i>Lonicera X Americana 'Pam's Pink'</i>	<a href="#">Pam's Pink Honeysuckle</a>	5 gal	This evergreen, twining shrub has waxy blue-green foliage and lightly scented, cream and pink blossoms.
Vine	<i>Passiflora caerulea</i>	<a href="#">Blue Passion Vine</a>	5 gal	Its unique flowers can be up to 4 inches in diameter with white outer petals and an inner layer of filaments that are ringed in blue, white, and dark purple towards the center. Monsoon rains spur the biggest flush of blooms in late summer and early fall, and many of them give off a light perfume as they open. Blue passion flower is one of the hardiest passion flower varieties you can buy.
<b>GRASSES</b>				
Grass	<i>Aristida purpurea</i>	<a href="#">Purple Three Awn</a>	1 gal	The purple-tinted stems and flowers of this erect, compact grass attract attention during the warm months, especially where it grows abundantly along roadsides.
Grass	<i>Bouteloua gracilis 'Blonde Ambition' PP22048</i>	<a href="#">Blonde Ambition Blue Grama</a>	1 gal	This showy selection of blue grama grass has huge chartreuse flowers that dance above the foliage
Grass	<i>Nassella tenuissima</i>	<a href="#">Mexican Feather Grass</a>	1 gal	Light breezes turn this fine-textured and billowy grass into living sculpture. Mexican feather grass forms a clump of chartreuse thread-like leaves and stems which turns gold in the winter.
<b>PERENNIALS</b>				
Perennial	<i>Abutilon palmeri</i>	<a href="#">Indian Mallow</a>	1 gal	Soft, velvety leaves and small, cup-shaped apricot-colored flowers
Perennial	<i>Agastache rupestris</i>	<a href="#">Hyssop, Sunset</a>	1 gal	With smoky orange flowers held by lavender calyxes, the entire plant is scented like licorice and mint.

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Perennial	<i>Aquilegia chrysantha</i>	<a href="#">Golden columbine</a>	1 gal	This herbaceous perennial produces golden yellow flowers from late spring to fall. Hummingbirds are attracted to the nectar-rich flowers.
Perennial	<i>Asclepias linaria 'Monarch Magnet 2.0'</i>	<a href="#">Monarch Magnet</a>	2 gal	Bright-white flower clusters emerge in springtime and stick around through fall. The leaves and flowers are an important food source for the Queen and Monarch butterfly larvae, whereas the nectar is a favorite of the adults.
Perennial	<i>Asclepias subulata</i>	<a href="#">Desert Milkweed</a>	5 gal	It has an erect, vertical form, with a dense cluster of gray-green herbaceous stems. It is virtually leafless, as short-lived leaves appear on new growth but drop quickly. Terminal clusters of pale yellow flowers appear intermittently from spring until fall.
Perennial	<i>Baileya multiradiata</i>	<a href="#">Desert Marigold</a>	1 gal	Bright yellow daisy-like flowers appear spring through fall and may bloom continuously at lower elevations. The blossoms are carried far above the rosette of wooly, silver-gray foliage on slender stems. This plant tolerates full sun, heat, cold and drought.
Perennial	<i>Berlandiera lyrata</i>	<a href="#">Chocolate Flower</a>	1 gal	In the summer and fall, yellow daisy flowers with maroon centers are borne on slender stems above the foliage
Perennial	<i>Conoclinium (Eupatorium) dissectum Boothill™</i>	<a href="#">Gregg's mistflower</a>	1 gal	During the warm season this plant is covered with clusters of fuzzy lavender flowers that are magnets for butterflies.
Perennial	<i>Coreopsis grandiflora 'early sunrise'</i>	<a href="#">Coreopsis, Early Sunrise</a>	1 gal	Blooming from late spring through fall, with semi-double yellow blossoms and glossy foliage. The flowers are continuous over the summer when deadheaded. Thrives in heat and sun, and requires well-drained soil.
Perennial	<i>Eriogonum fasciculatum v. poliofolium</i>	<a href="#">Flattop Buckwheat</a>	1 gal	The small dark green leaves have a white wooly underside. White to pink flowers appear in dense flattened clusters throughout the spring and summer.
Perennial	<i>Gaillardia X 'Arizona Sun'</i>	<a href="#">Arizona Sun Blanketflower</a>	1 gal	Arizona Sun is a variety selected for its profuse display of large, two-toned flowers that are produced throughout the warm season.

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Perennial	<i>Gaura lindheimeri</i> 'Siskyou Pink'	<a href="#">Pink Gaura</a>	1 gal and 3 gal	Sprays of small pink orchid-like blooms cover the stems in low deserts during the spring and fall. Plant in full sun in middle to high deserts, but provide some afternoon protection in the hottest zones.
Perennial	<i>Gaura lindheimeri</i> 'Pink Cloud'	<a href="#">Pink Cloud Gaura</a>	5 gal	Leaves are narrow and dark green, often with a purple tinge. Sprays of pink flowers are produced spring through fall, but here in the low desert blooming slows down in the summer.
Perennial	<i>Lantana X 'Dallas Red'</i>	<a href="#">Dallas Red Lantana</a>	1 gal	This colorful hybrid has bright red flowers with golden yellow highlights. The flower show begins in late spring and continues well into fall.
Perennial	<i>Melempodium leucanthum</i>	<a href="#">Blackfoot Daisy</a>	1 gal	It has narrow grey-green leaves, brittle stems, and is covered with small white daisy flowers in the warm months
Perennial	<i>Oenothera caespitosa</i>	<a href="#">Tufted Evening Primrose</a>	1 gal	From spring through late summer it produces masses of huge white flowers that open in the late afternoon and fade to pink by morning.
Perennial	<i>Oenothera elata</i>	<a href="#">Hooker's Evening-primrose</a>	5 inch	This is one of the largest and showiest of the evening-primroses. The biennial spends its first year as a low rosette of leaves. The second year, clusters of bright yellow, 3 in., flowers are borne atop the leafy 3-6 ft. stems. These flowers unfurl in late afternoon or at dusk, are quite fragrant, and have four heart-shaped petals.
Perennial	<i>Oenothera speciosa</i>	<a href="#">Mexican Evening Primrose</a>	1 gal	This herbaceous perennial has small green leaves and produces carpets of delicate light to dark pink flowers each spring.
Perennial	<i>Penstemon baccharifolius</i> Diablo™	<a href="#">Diablo™ Rock Penstemon</a>	1 gal	It blooms in the late spring and summer with short terminal spikes of rose-red flowers that attract hummingbirds.
Perennial	<i>Penstemon barbatus</i> 'Coral Baby'	<a href="#">Coral Baby Penstemon</a>	1 gal	This stunning hybrid Penstemon barbatus is a blooming machine.

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Perennial	<i>Penstemon eatoni</i>	<a href="#">Firecracker Penstemon</a>	1 gal	It blooms in late winter to early spring with spikes of rich red flowers. Hummingbirds love it! Glossy dark green leaves form a low clump. Plant in full sun and well-drained soils. It reseeds readily.
Perennial	<i>Penstemon pseudospectabilis</i>	<a href="#">Canyon Penstemon</a>	1 gal	Tall spikes of rose-purple flowers attract hummingbirds in the spring and summer. The broad, triangular green leaves are fused at the base of the stem, and have serrated margins. Plant in full sun to part shade and provide excellent drainage. It reseeds readily.
Perennial	<i>Penstemon superbus</i>	<a href="#">Superb Penstemon</a>	1 gal	This stunner shoots up spikes of vivid coral flowers as tall as six feet in the spring. Large blue-green leaves often have a tinge of purple. Hummingbirds love the flowers.
Perennial	<i>Penstemon triflorus</i>	<a href="#">Hill Country Penstemon</a>	1 gal and 3 gal	This Texas perennial blooms in early spring, sending up 2-foot-tall spikes of large deep rose flowers, which attract hummingbirds. The foliage is a deep, glossy green.
Perennial	<i>Poliomintha maderensis</i> Lavender Spice™	<a href="#">Mexican Oregano</a>	1 gal	This mounding, brittle, woody perennial has small, bright green leaves with a delicious oregano fragrance.
Perennial	<i>Ruellia brittoniana</i> 'katie'	<a href="#">Purple Dwarf Ruellia</a>	1 gal	This compact herbaceous perennial has long, narrow, dark green leaves and blooms heavily during the warm months with showy tubular, petunia-like blue flowers. Plant in full sun or part shade, and provide moderate irrigation.
Perennial	<i>Russelia X St. Elmo's Fire</i> ™	<a href="#">St. Elmo's Fire</a> ™	3 gal	Although similar to <i>Russelia equisetiformis</i> , this hybrid has deeper red flowers and a more open, airy growth habit. Also, the stems are lined with tiny round green leaves, while the species is essentially leafless.
Perennial	<i>Salvia farinacea</i>	<a href="#">Mealycup Sage</a>	3 gal	Mealycup sage provides an attractive mass of blue flowers in beds, borders and naturalized areas.
Perennial	<i>Salvia greggii</i>	<a href="#">Autumn Sage</a>	1 gal, 2 gal, and 5 gal	Several cultivars available. Beautiful clusters of red flowers are produced at branch tips all through the warm season, but in the low desert flower production will drop off in the summer.

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Perennial	<i>Salvia X Trident</i> <sup>TM</sup>	<a href="#">Trident<sup>TM</sup> Sage</a>	3 gal	This woody perennial is a three-way hybrid between <i>Salvia mojavensis</i> , <i>S. clevelandii</i> and <i>S. dorrii</i> . The small, aromatic silvery leaves provide an effective backdrop for the spikes bearing whorls of cobalt blue flowers. Flowers attract hummingbirds from spring through summer.
Perennial	<i>Salvia X 'Ultra Violet'</i>	<a href="#">Ultra Violet Sage</a>	5 gal	'Ultra Violet' is a cross between blue flowered <i>Salvia lycioides</i> and pink <i>Salvia greggii</i> . This stunning <i>Salvia</i> grows to 20" tall and 28" wide and will display a showy set of vibrant purple blooms from late spring through October.
Perennial	<i>Salvia nemerosa 'may night'</i>	<a href="#">May Night Salvia</a>	1 gal	Spikes of purple flowers rise above a compact rosette of large, aromatic, rough-textured green leaves. With flower spikes, the mature size tops out at 18 inches tall and wide.
Perennial	<i>Scutellaria suffrutescens</i>	<a href="#">Pink Skullcap</a>	1 gal	Waves of pink flowers that look like little snapdragons grace this plant from spring through fall.
Perennial	<i>Sphaeralcea ambigua Louis Hamilton</i> <sup>TM</sup>	<a href="#">Louis Hamilton<sup>TM</sup> Globe Mallow</a>	1 gal & 5 gal	This cutting-grown selection of the species has bright red-orange blossoms.
Perennial	<i>Sphaeralcea ambigua 'Orange Crush'</i> PPAF	<a href="#">Desert Globe Mallow</a>	2 gal	'Orange Crush' produces abundant orange flowers from late December through June and thrives in both the landscape and containers. It is ideal for dry, low-water areas.
Perennial	<i>Tetaneuris acaulis</i>	<a href="#">Angelita Daisy</a>	1 gal	It forms a compact, dense mound of slender green grass-like leaves. Golden daisy-like blossoms perch above the foliage on tall, leafless stems during the warm months.
Perennial	<i>Thymophylla pentachaeta</i>	<a href="#">Golden Dogbane</a>	1 gal	Mounds of fragrant, lacy, bright green leaves are almost hidden by clusters of tiny gold daisy-like flowers in the warm months.
Perennial	<i>Wedelia texana Devil's River</i> <sup>TM</sup>	<a href="#">Devil's River<sup>TM</sup></a>	1 gal	This Texas native provides a lot of summer color, blooming from spring through fall with orange-yellow daisy-like flowers.
Perennial	<i>Zephyranthes candida</i>	<a href="#">White Rain Lily</a>	1 gal	Native to Central and South America, this little bulb forms a clump of narrow, glossy, dark green leaves. In the summer and early fall, it is covered with waxy white flowers.

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Perennial	<i>Zephyranthes X 'Prairie Sunset'</i>	<a href="#">Coral Rain Lily</a>	1 gal	This hybrid between <i>Zephyranthes x 'Capricorn'</i> and <i>Zephyranthes candida</i> has a more evergreen quality during the hot summer months. The waxy crocus-like flowers are apricot colored.
Perennial	<i>Zinnia acerosa</i>	<a href="#">Desert Zinnia</a>	1 gal	Native from southern Arizona to west Texas, this semi-woody perennial has gray-green needlelike leaves. In the summer it is covered with many small, papery white flowers with yellow centers.
Perennial	<i>Zinnia grandiflora</i>	<a href="#">Prairie Zinnia</a>	1 gal	This deciduous, long-lived perennial groundcover spreads by underground stems to form colonies. It blooms though the summer and into fall with yellow-orange daisy-like flowers.
<b>SHRUBS</b>				
Shrub	<i>Anisicanthus quadrifidus v. wrightii</i>	<a href="#">Mexican Fire™</a>	5 gal	Its narrow, rich green leaves provide an effective backdrop for terminal spikes of tubular red-orange flowers.
Shrub	<i>Artemesia filifolia</i>	<a href="#">Sand Sage</a>	1 gal	The fragrant, threadlike leaves and stems of this airy evergreen shrub are covered with white hairs, giving it a lovely silvery cast.
Shrub	<i>Atriplex canescens</i>	<a href="#">Four Wing Saltbush</a>	1 gal	Female plants produce unique papery-thin, 4-winged fruit that are a favorite source of food for birds and small mammals.
Shrub	<i>Buddleja marrubiiifolia</i>	<a href="#">Wooly Butterfly Bush</a>	2 gal and 5 gal	Orange, marble-sized blossoms occur throughout the year, with the heaviest bloom in spring and summer. They are not extremely showy, but they attract many butterflies. This Chihuahuan Desert native is very tolerant of heat, cold, intense sun and drought.
Shrub	<i>Calliandra eriophylla</i>	<a href="#">Pink Fairy Duster</a>	5 gal	Tiny fern-like green leaves drop in the winter or in extreme summer drought to expose the the densely-branched form. Light pink to white powder puff flowers appear for a short time in the spring.
Shrub	<i>Calliandra X 'LIANCA' Sierra Starr™</i>	<a href="#">Sierra Starr</a>	5 gal	This clone blooms almost year-round with stunning bright red flowers, which are irresistible to hummingbirds and native bees.

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Shrub	<i>Chrysactinia mexicana</i>	<a href="#">Damianita</a>	5 gal	This small evergreen shrub has fragrant, bright green needlelike foliage. It blooms heavily in the fall and spring with golden daisy-like flowers.
Shrub	<i>Cordia parvifolia</i>	<a href="#">Little Leaf Cordia</a>	5 gal	Warm, humid conditions trigger blooming, resulting in a profusion of snowy white blossoms. This tough evergreen shrub is easy to grow and maintenance-free. It forms a naturally dense wide-spreading shrub.
Shrub	<i>Encelia farinosa</i>	<a href="#">Brittlebush</a>	1 gal and 5 gal	Large gray leaves contrast with the bright yellow daisy-like flowers produced in the spring.
Shrub	<i>Fallugia paradoxa</i>	<a href="#">Apache Plume</a>	1 gal & 5 gal	It blooms in the spring with small white flowers, followed by white to pink feathery fruit clusters
Shrub	<i>Justicia spicigera</i>	<a href="#">Mexican Honeysuckle</a>	1 gal and 5 gal	This lush evergreen shrub is native to Mexico and South America. It has large, oval, velvety, medium green leaves. Bright orange tubular flowers are borne in clusters all year in warmer areas and during the summer in colder regions.
Shrub	<i>Larrea tridentata</i>	<a href="#">Creosote Bush</a>	5 gal	This tough evergreen shrub is especially aromatic after a rain. In the wild it has an open form with sparse olive green foliage on woody stems. Irrigated plants will be much more lush and grow faster. Small yellow spring flowers are followed by fuzzy seedpods.
Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum frutescens</i> 'Compacta'	<a href="#">Compact Texas Ranger</a>	5 gal	Its dense, rounded form requires little or no pruning, and its mature size of about 5 feet tall and wide is still small enough to warrant a space in most residential gardens
Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum frutescens</i> 'Green Cloud'	<a href="#">Texas Ranger 'Green Cloud'</a>	5 gal	This semi-evergreen, fast-growing shrub has lush green foliage and blooms frequently in the summer and fall with showy rose-pink flowers

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Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum frutescens</i> 'San Antonio Rose' PP33454	<a href="#">San Antonio Rose Texas Sage PP3</a>	1 gal and 5 gal	Silver leafed branches burst with bright rose pink blooms continuously throughout the summer, especially when humidity spikes. San Antonio Rose won't damp off like other Texas Rangers-- the crop was bred to thrive in landscapes throughout the Southwest.
Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum laevigatum</i> 'summer snow'	<a href="#">White flowering chihuahuan sage</a>	5 gal	Originating in Durango, Mexico, this evergreen shrub was selected by Greg Starr and is similar in look to the Chihuahuan sage ( <i>L. laevigatum</i> ) with the exception of the lovely white flowers. Summer Snow delightfully bursts into bloom triggered by monsoon weather.
Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum langmaniae</i> 'Lynn's Legacy'	<a href="#">Lynn's Legacy Sage</a>	5 gal	This evergreen shrub grows moderately, forming a dense, rounded mound of sage green foliage. Masses of lavender flowers are produced in the summer and fall. This selection is not as dependent on changes in relative humidity for flowering, which means that it blooms more often during the warm months.
Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum pruinosum sierra bouquet</i> ™	<a href="#">Fragrant Sage</a>	5 gal	Open and sprawling in form, this clone has silver-grey foliage and extremely fragrant violet flowers. The flowers smell like grape bubble gum, and are produced on and off during the summer and fall.
Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum x Laevigatum</i> 'Purple Rain'	<a href="#">Purple Rain</a>	1 gal and 5 gal	Texas Sage is notorious for cold tolerance, drought resistance, and love for hot, sunny climates as it thrives in poor soils throughout the Southwest. Purple Rain grows densely upright and requires little maintenance. Birds and bees are attracted to its lightly fragrant flowers.
Shrub	<i>Leucophyllum zygophyllum</i> cimarron®	<a href="#">Cimarron® Sage, Cenizo</a>	5 gal	This petite evergreen shrub has a soft, rounded form, with distinctively cupped grey-green leaves. Masses of blue flowers are produced on and off during the summer and fall.

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Shrub	<i>Lycium andersonii</i>	<a href="#">Desert Wolfberry</a>	1 gal	Clusters of small tubular lavender flowers are produced in the spring, followed by juicy red berries. This shrub is an important source of food and shelter for birds and animals.
Shrub	<i>Plumbago scandens</i> 'Summer Snow'	<a href="#">White Plumbago</a>	1 gal	Dark, glossy green narrow leaves provide a lush backdrop for masses of white flowers that appear all summer.
Shrub	<i>Rhus virens v. virens</i>	<a href="#">Evergreen Sumac</a>	5 gal	The dark green, rounded compound leaves have thick waxy leaflets. Clusters of white flowers in the spring are followed by showy red berries.
Shrub	<i>Salvia clevelandii</i>	<a href="#">Chaparral Sage</a>	1 gal & 5 gal	This evergreen shrub has highly aromatic gray-green foliage. The unusual flower spikes consist of clusters of blue-violet flowers stacked like shish-kebobs along the spike.
Shrub	<i>Tecoma stans v. stans</i> 'Gold Star'	<a href="#">Yellow Bells 'Gold Star'</a>	2 gal and 5 gal	This selection of the species blooms profusely with large clusters of bright yellow flowers.
Shrub	<i>Tecoma X</i> 'Crimson Flare'	<a href="#">Crimson Flare Esperanza</a>	5 gal	This clone has outstanding deep green foliage, providing a showy backdrop for the red blossoms.
Shrub	<i>Tecoma X</i> 'Orange Jubilee'	<a href="#">Orange Jubilee</a>	5 gal	This semi-deciduous, upright woody shrub has lush green compound leaves and produces masses of orange trumpet-shaped flowers during the warm months.

Succulent	<i>Agave parviflora</i>	<a href="#">Small-flower agave</a>	2 gal	As the plant matures expect it to reach up to 25 cm (10") tall and around 20 cm (8") in diameter. The plant's main feature are the strange shaped leaves with white lines all around them and white strings.
