



47.9% YES

46.0% ate less then they felt they should because there was not enough money for food in 2022 compared to 48.4% in 2021.

Despite being hungry, 38.2% of respondents did not 52.1% eat because they did not have enough money in 2022 compared to 39.8% in 2021.
