INSTRUCTORS INTRODUCTION

Alix Gaytan is a native of El Paso/Juarez area. She received her BFA in Painting with a minor in Printmaking from the University of Texas at El Paso and her MFA in Painting from Pennsylvania State University.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Basic Design I is an introductory course to expose students to the fundamental principles of art, design, and visual communication. An introduction to two-dimensional design's fundamental terminology, concepts, theory, and application. Emphasizes experimentation and practices in basic design projects using visual communication techniques and creative problem-solving. This introductory course provides a foundation in the fundamental elements and principles of 2D design. Projects emphasize developing fluency in handling media and increasing awareness of craftsmanship. Lectures and critiques cultivate verbal communication skills to foster a facility with the language of art and design.

COURSE GOALS & OBJECTIVES

- Development and understanding of the basic terminology of art and design.
- Development and understanding of good composition principles.
- Development and understanding of technical skills such as simple drawing, painting, and cutting skills needed to render well-composed 2-dimensional designs.
- Development of good craftsmanship and working habits needed to achieve these goals and objectives.

COURSE OUTCOMES

Students who complete the course will be able to:

- Create properly composed, well-balanced 2-dimensional designs using various materials. Effectively use the visual elements in a composition and apply the principles of design for stronger, more creative, and effective 2-D artwork.
- Identify and recognize a well-crafted design.
- Be aware of various art movements and concepts through exposure to various artists and artworks
- Acquire a basic knowledge of art terminology to express ideas verbally.

INSTRUCTOR'S POLICIES

Attendance/Participation

Attendance, punctuality, participation and appropriate class conduct are crucial. Failure to perform to required standards will result in strong grade penalties and can cause failure of this course.

- Each student is permitted 2 absences during the semester without penalty (This statement does not include critique days.) Students with more than 2 absences should consider dropping this course and retaking it at a time when the student can commit the proper attention to the course.
- Each unexcused absence after 2 will result in the final course grade being lowered by 1 full letter grade. Absences after the first 2 can be excused only if the first 2 absences are excused.
- Excused absences are defined as documented illness or serious illness or death in the immediate family.
- Coming to class late or leaving early is unacceptable. All students are required to attend class on time and to remain in the class the entire time. Entering class late and leaving early is disruptive, disrespectful and sets an intolerable standard for everyone.
- $3 \times \frac{1}{2}$ hour or less late = 1 absence
- More than. $\frac{1}{2}$ hour late = 1 absence
- Coming to class unprepared or attending class and not working is regarded as absent.
- Information missed during an absence is the sole responsibility of the student.
- Final Attendance Grade will be calculated at the end of the semester.

Students must log onto Blackboard daily and attend face-to-face meetings according to the schedule provided at the beginning of the course. If an emergency occurs and you must be absent, you must show proof/or documentation of the event for your absence to be excused. Absences may be excused with proper notification for documented serious illness, documented COVID issues, documented child-care emergencies, documented death in the immediate family, or documented university-sanctioned events. Scheduled appointments, transportation problems, and job demands are not excused absences.

Unexcused absences and late arrivals to class will be counted against your overall grade.

Course Communication

Please check the top of the syllabus for days and times. I will only answer emails Monday through Friday from 8-5 am. I will not be available during weekends. I suggest maintaining all communication through Blackboard, so please try to make this your first option for communicating with me. Announcements will be made weekly via Blackboard for reminders of possible events occurring during the upcoming week. Check Blackboard daily.

Community Atmosphere

Studio courses involve constructive dialogue between classmates and the instructor. We can learn much from one another through open communication and collaboration during class. Communication is important in this class. If you ever need anything in class, do not hesitate to communicate. Listening to your peers, asking questions, joining discussions, and actively engaging in class activities benefit everyone's learning experience and will positively affect your grade. Lastly, each student will clean their working area at the end of each class.

Constant focus on your projects during class is expected. This is part of your participation grade. Any student creating distractions for other students or constantly moving in or outside the studio for no reason will be marked as late or absent.

Breaks: For in-person classes, we will have a ten-minute break about halfway through class for lunch, checking emails, chatting, etc.

Electronics Policy

Electronics will be used at the instructor's discretion. However, there will be ZERO tolerance for constant texting, or any electronic distractions not related to the course content. If you need to take a call, you can simply step outside of the classroom. Any student not complying with this policy will be marked late or absent.

Coursework and Assessment

- Projects are the main core of this course. Constant practice is key to continuing to improve your
 drawing skills. There are expectations to work outside class time to finish the projects, so keep
 this in mind.
- Critiques and portfolio reviews are essential to this course so that they will have no make-up option. These are equivalent to exams. Guidelines will be explained later in the semester.
- A digital portfolio will be submitted via Blackboard.

Make-up Work/Late Assignments/Unfinished Submissions

- Make-up work or late assignments will be accepted at the instructor's discretion.
- Unfinished submissions (if accepted by instructor) will receive a grade not higher than 79-70 (C, Keep Experimenting).
- Any student arriving late to a group critique will receive a grade not higher than 79-70 (C, Keep Experimenting) to their portfolio/critique grade.
- All ASSIGNMENTS MUST BE COMPLETED and DISPLAYED DURING CRITIQUE DAY TO QUALIFY FOR FULL CREDIT.
- NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE GIVEN FOR ANY GROUP CRITIQUE.

There is no textbook required for this course. Reading materials will be supplied on Blackboard. However, there are drawing materials each student will have to purchase for this course. The size and quantity of these materials are required. Please use the recommended brands in the materials list. If you already have drawing materials that are like these, cannot find something, or if you have any questions at all, please let me know. Also, I recommend buying locally since shipping could take some time. Note: You will likely need to restock some materials as the semester progresses

- Pencil sharpener.
- Ruler 12" or 18"
- Artbin or toolbox. The size is up to you.
- Portfolio, bigger than 18"x24". (Preferable Hard-Case but fabric or cardboard will suffice)
