#### INSTRUCTOR INTRODUCTION

Alix Gaytan is a native of El Paso/Juarez area. She received her BFA in Painting with a minor in Printmaking from the University of Texas at El Paso and earned her MFA in Painting from Pennsylvania State University.

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

ARTF 1302 DRAWING 1- This introductory class will expose the student to several traditional skills and ideas that have occupied artists throughout history. The class draws from direct observation emphasizing space, volume, linear and free-hand perspective, and other fundamental techniques and concepts. Seeing/drawing skills are developed, and sensitivity toward the aesthetics of form and space, including linear perspective, mark making, value, line, and line quality, is explored. The student must develop disciplined work habits and understand the visual artist's formal language. There will be regular progress and group critiques to assess each assigned project. Students will work in black and white dry media on various surfaces to depict different types of subject matter.

## **COURSE GOALS & OBJECTIVES**

- Become familiar with the uses and qualities of various drawing media.
- Learned foundational drawing skills and techniques such as realistic rendering, shading, line quality, perspective, drawing from life, and more.
- Demonstrate their understanding of course content through various exercises and assignments, culminating in a final portfolio review.
- Develop the skills to confidently and capably discuss drawing in personal reflections and a group critique setting.

Students who successfully complete this course:

- Will have the skills to use value to build form and be able to develop pictorial space
- Will have a greater understanding of the contemporary art world

- Will have greater confidence in their ability to plan and commit to an idea
- Will have the ability to critically assess their own and other's work

- Will have experience and competency in handling various drawing media.
- Will be familiar with drawing terminology

## **INSTRUCTOR'S POLICIES**

## Attendance/Participation

Attendance, punctuality, participation and appropriate class conduct are crucial. Failure to perform to required standards will result in strong grade penalties and can cause failure of this course.

- Each student is permitted 2 absences during the semester without penalty (This statement does not include critique days.) Students with more than 2 absences should consider dropping this course and retaking it at a time when the student can commit the proper attention to the course.
- Each unexcused absence after 2 will result in the final course grade being lowered by 1 full letter grade. Absences after the first 2 can be excused only if the first 2 absences are excused.
- Excused absences are defined as documented illness or serious illness or death in the immediate family.
- Coming to class late or leaving early is unacceptable. All students are required to attend class on time and to remain in the class the entire time. Entering class late and leaving early is disruptive, disrespectful and sets an intolerable standard for everyone.
- $3 \times \frac{1}{2}$  hour or less late = 1 absence
- More than,  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour late = 1 absence
- Coming to class unprepared or attending class and not working is regarded as absent.
- Information missed during an absence is the sole responsibility of the student.
- Final Attendance Grade will be calculated at the end of the semester.

Students must log onto Blackboard daily and attend face-to-face meetings according to the schedule provided at the beginning of the course. If an emergency occurs and you must be absent, you must show proof/or documentation of the event for your absence to be excused. Studio courses involve constructive dialogue between classmates and the instructor. We can learn much from one another through open communication and collaboration during class. Listening to your peers, asking questions, joining discussions, and actively engaging in class activities benefit everyone's learning experience and will positively affect your grade. Constant focus on your projects during class is expected. This is part of your participation grade.

Any student creating distractions for other students or constantly moving in or outside the studio for no reason will be marked as late or absent.

Breaks: For in-person classes, we will have a ten-minute break about halfway through class for lunch, checking emails, chatting, etc.

Lastly, each student will clean their work area at the end of each class.

## **Electronics Policy**

Electronics will be used at the instructor's discretion. However, there will be ZERO tolerance for constant texting, or any electronic distractions not related to the course content. If you need to take a call, you can simply step outside of the classroom. Any student not complying with this policy will be marked late or absent.

#### **Coursework and Assessment**

- Projects are the main core of this course. Constant practice is key to continuing to improve your drawing skills. There are expectations to work outside class time to finish the projects, so keep this in mind.
- Critiques and portfolio reviews are essential to this course so that they will have no make-up option. These are equivalent to exams. Guidelines will be explained later in the semester.

## Make-up Work/Late Assignments/Unfinished Submissions

- Make-up work or late assignments will be accepted at the instructor's discretion.
- Unfinished submissions (if accepted by instructor) will receive a grade not higher than 79-70 (C, Keep Experimenting).
- Any student arriving late to a group critique will receive a grade not higher than 79-70 (C, Keep Experimenting) to their portfolio/critique grade.
- All ASSIGNMENTS MUST BE COMPLETED and DISPLAYED DURING CRITIQUE DAY TO QUALIFY FOR FULL CREDIT.
- NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE GIVEN FOR ANY GROUP CRITIQUE

## **REQUIRED MATERIALS**

There is no textbook required for this course. Reading materials will be supplied in Blackboard. However, there are drawing materials each student will have to purchase for this course. The size and quantity of these materials are required. Please use the recommended brands in the materials list. If you already have drawing materials that are similar to these, cannot find something, or if you have any questions at all, please let me know. Also, I recommend buying locally since shipping could take some time. Note: You will likely need to restock some materials as the semester progresses.

- 18"x24" 80+lb White Drawing Paper Pad for dry media (24+ sheets) 80lb is the paperweight. The heavier the weight, the better.
- \*\*\*Stonehenge Paper. The school will provide it for you.
- \*\*\*Graphite drawing pencils. The school will provide it for you.
- \*\*\*Charcoal Pencil Kit. The school will provide it for you.
- \*\*\*3+ sticks Black compressed charcoal sticks (medium hardness). The school will provide it for you.
- 6+ pieces of vine charcoal. Very fragile choose pieces as thick as a pencil.
- \*\*\*Blending Stumps Tools or Variety of Cotton Swaps. Any brand will do.
- Micron Pens with pen tips: 01, 05, 08, brush tip, or any variety pack. Black ink only. Brands: Staedtler, Faber-Castell, Sakura, Coptic
- White vinyl artist's eraser.
- Kneaded rubber eraser. The school will provide it for you.
- Fine Point Eraser or pencil eraser (or similar)
- White artist's tape (1 in. wide). This is not masking tape. White artist's tape only.
- Workable Fixative. Recommended: Grumbacher or Krylon Workable Fixatif (toxic, flammable, can't be used indoors)
- Pencil sharpener. The school will provide it for you.
- Ruler 18"
- Container for smaller materials or toolbox
- Portfolio, 24" X 36" (Preferable Hard-Case but fabric or cardboard will suffice)
- Sketch Book (OPTIONAL)
