INSTRUCTOR'S INTRODUCTION: Hector Romero received his BFA in painting and drawing from UTEP and his MFA from UCLA. After living in NYC for 15 years as an art book seller and working artist, Hector returned to El Paso in 2011.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Basic Drawing 2 is a foundations course that serves as a follow up to Drawing 1. Students will continue to develop their drawing skills with the goal of moving towards personal content in one's drawings. Color media will be introduced in this course which will supplement traditional pencil, charcoal, and pen media. Basic Drawing 2 is a studio course designed to serve the needs of studio art majors. Lectures, critiques, and Power Point presentations are components of this course. Students will be given specific drawing assignments which will be worked on in class and require outside studio time for completion. All deadlines will be announced but maybe subject to change. The development of critical skills, dialogue, and exchange of ideas with classmates and instructor are goals to be worked on in this course.

Drawing is defined as a picture or diagram made with a pencil, pen, or crayon rather than paint. Some other thoughts regarding Drawing 2:

- Structure some of the basics
- Improvisation sudden change in direction to change the pace of the class
- Energy A reaction to the class zeitgeist
- Experience Hands on work, trial and error, working thru the process, and learning thru the process

COURSE PRE-REQUISITE INFORMATION: The prerequisite for Basic Drawing 2 is ARTF 1302 Drawing 1

COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:

- Further development of drawing skills necessary to render 3-D forms and space in a convincing illusionistic manner
- Experience in handling varied drawing media
- Development of successful compositions
- Exposure to contemporary trends in drawing
- Development of personal imagery
- Planning skills and creative thinking
- Improve ability to speak critically about artwork

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Two reviews of student work will take place during the semester. Dates TBA. Please note this does not refer to critiques. In addition to class assignments, weekend homework may be assigned at instructor's discretion. Articulation of ideas and participation in critiques are important to the student's artistic growth.

COURSE POLICIES:

Regular attendance is required. Roll will be taken every day. Arrive to class on time with the materials needed for class and stay until the end of class. Still life's, class discussions, power points, and lectures are impossible to make up.

After 3 absences your final grade will be lowered by 5 points for every additional absence. Absences may be excused with official documentation for serious illness, death in the immediate family, or university sanctioned events. Arriving to class late or leaving early counts as ½ absence. Students with excessive absences and tardiness should consider dropping this course and taking at a time when the student can commit to the course.

Critiques are equivalent to an exam. Late arrivals to critiques may not be critiqued, this will be at the discretion of the instructor. No show to critique on the day you are presenting will receive a grade of F/0. No show to the day you are in the audience will receive a grade of D/65.

Turn off your cell phone when in class. Texting and using cell phone in class will reflect in your grade. If it is an emergency, deal with it and communicate with the instructor.

Please keep the studio clean by cleaning up after yourself at the end of each class session.

Incompletes, Withdrawals, Pass/Fail: Incompletes or "I" grades will be considered for students completing satisfactory or better work and having serious legitimate situations beyond their control requiring additional time to complete the course requirements. All "I" grades are at the discretion of the instructor and the approval of the Dept. chair. Students hold full responsibility for withdrawing from this course if that procedure is elected. Withdrawals must be completed on or before the final date to drop a course with a W. Student initiated drops are permitted after deadline and in this case, instructor will issue a grade of W or F.

This is a grade-based course and is not available for pass/fail options.

CRITIQUE:

Formal and informal critiques will be held during the course of the semester. Students are expected to participate fully in class critiques both by offering constructive commentary to their peers and by later considering and applying what has been discussed to one's own work. When you examine and critique your work or the work of others, evaluate not just the aesthetic sensibility or the artistic achievement of the work. Evaluate also:

- The focus of the work
- What you think is being communicated
- The points of struggle in the work, what's working, what's not working
- How problems can be resolved

CRITIQUE ETIQUETTE:

- Don't miss critiques!
- Arrive on time to set up work
- If you arrive late do not interrupt class by setting up your work. Work may or may not be reviewed, this will be at the discretion of the instructor
- Listen carefully to comments about your work
- Listen to comments about the work of your peers (it probably applies to you too)
- Contribute to the discussion
- Don't disrupt the critique with private conversations or cell phone use
