INSTRUCTOR'S INTRODUCTION: Hector Romero received his BFA in painting and drawing from UTEP and his MFA from UCLA. After living in NYC for 15 years as an art book seller and working artist, Hector returned to El Paso in 2011.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Painting 4 is a course that builds on techniques learned in painting 1-3 that lead to the development of one's own imagery, ideas, and concepts. You are expected to work in the studio during class time and outside of class in order to develop the work ethic required to be a successful painter. The ability to discuss your work and classmate's work in creative, concise and formal analytical terms is an important aspect of the class.

COURSE PRE-REQUISITE INFORMATION: The prerequisites for Painting 3331 are ARTF 1301 ARTF 1302, and PNTNG 1-3 or instructor approval.

COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:

- Experience the handling of paint
- Address composition
- Exposure to painting both historical and contemporary
- Further develop one's ability critically discuss art works
- Development of personal ideas and imagery
- A strong work ethic

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Student work will be reviewed throughout the course of the semester, meaning I will be following the progress of your work. A body of work is the goal you should be focused on as this will contribute to the development of your ideas, artistic vision, and success. Only completing 1 or 2 paintings in the semester is unacceptable. A high level of artistic work ethic is expected. A lack of work ethic will result in a low output and defeats the purpose of the course. Readings and other instructional media may be provided to the class or individual students to allow for discussions as a group or one-to-one. Participation, discussion, and attendance to critiques are required. In certain cases, specific assignments may be given to student(s) in order address issues or concepts on an as-needed basis. A written statement regarding your work (2-3 paragraphs) will be required for the course. A due date will be announced, and failure to write the statement will result in a drop of a letter grade. Work 4-5 hours per week outside of class time in studio.

Factors considered in grading are: completion of a body of work (7 to 10 paintings), articulation of ideas and participation during critiques and discussions, work ethic avoiding cell phone use, quality of work, progress, growth, and attendance. Wandering in and out of the classroom is unacceptable. Working outside of class time 4-5 hours per week.

COURSE POLICIES:

Regular attendance is required. Roll will be taken every day. Arrive to class on time with the materials needed for class and stay until the end of class.

After 3 absences your final grade will be lowered by 5 points for every additional absence. Absences may be excused with official documentation for serious illness, death in the immediate family, or university sanctioned events. Arriving to class late or leaving early counts as ½ absence. Students with excessive absences and tardiness should consider dropping this course and taking at a time when the student can commit to the course.

Critiques are equivalent to an exam. Late arrivals to critiques may not be critiqued, this will be at the discretion of the instructor.

Turn off your cell phone when in class. Texting and using cell phone in class will reflect in your grade. If it is an emergency, deal with it and communicate with the instructor.

Please keep the studio clean by cleaning up after yourself at the end of each class session.

Incompletes, Withdrawals, Pass/Fail: Incompletes or "I" grades will be considered for students completing satisfactory or better work and having serious legitimate situations beyond their control requiring additional time to complete the course requirements. All "I" grades are at the discretion of the instructor and the approval of the Dept. chair. Students hold the full responsibility for withdrawing from this course if that procedure is elected. Withdrawals must be completed on or before the final date to drop a course with a W. Student initiated drops are permitted after deadline and in this case instructor will issue a grade of W or F. This is a grade-based course and is not available for pass/fail options.

MATERIALS AND PERSONAL EQUIPMENT: each student must have their own materials. Borrowing from other students is unacceptable.

- White, Alizarin, Cad Red hue, Cad Yellow hue, Ultramarine Blue, Pthalo Blue, Pthalo Green, Burnt Sienna, Dioxazine Purple, Paynes Grey, Yellow Ochre
- Set of 7 Pro-stroke bristle brushes
- Palette knife, containers, jars, paint rags
- Lava soap for brush cleaning
- Spray bottle
- Color wheel
- Masking or Blue painter's tape
 *Please note paint runs out and you may have to purchase more as the semester progresses.

Health and Safety: Students will be working with oil paint, OMS, paint medium. No food or drinks are allowed in the studio place these items on the cart outside of the studio. Never pour OMS or gesso down the sink. Cleaning procedures will be explained at the beginning of the semester. Nitrile gloves are recommended for the course best place to purchase is Harbor Freight.

Supplies are available at Michael's, Hobby Lobby. And Art Center (on Yandell). On line you may order from Blick Art. Additional supplies may be needed. Students should sign up for a locker in the Art Office, room 350 Fox Fine Arts.

CRITIQUE:

Formal and informal critiques will be held during the course of the semester. Students are expected to participate fully in class critiques both by offering constructive commentary to their peers and by later considering and applying what has been discussed to one's own work. When you examine and critique your work or the work of others, evaluate not just the aesthetic sensibility or the artistic achievement of the work. Evaluate also:

- The focus of the work
- What you think is being communicated
- The points of struggle in the work, what's working what's not working
- How problems can be resolved

CRITIQUE ETIQUETTE:

- Don't miss critiques!
- Arrive on time to set up work
- If you arrive late do not interrupt class by setting up your work. Work may or may not be reviewed, this will be at the discretion of the instructor
- Listen carefully to comments about your work
- Listen to comments about the work of your peers (it probably applies to you too)
- Contribute to the discussion
- Don't disrupt the critique with private conversations or cell phone use
