

Introduction

Art 1300 is an introductory course to visual literacy. We will explore how the Visual Arts have been interpreted, valued, and the functions they have played in distinct societies through a variety of cultural contexts and historical periods from pre-modern to contemporary society. We will identify artistic styles, techniques, conceptual issues, and traditions related to visual art. Students will be introduced to a basic overview of art history, but the main objective will be to develop skills for discussion and active engagement with art.

Guidelines

Students will be required to actively participate on multiple levels. Each week the course material will be presented as online lectures supplemented with readings, links and short videos. Students will be required to participate on the Discussion Forum to demonstrate their comprehension of the material and earn class participation credit. Your learning and ultimate performance will depend on careful listening and reading of the lectures and texts, responding critically to them, and engaging with other students' ideas in the virtual classroom, on assignments, quizzes and tests.

Four Course Policies

1. General Questions

Post all general questions about the class materials, the readings or the assignments to the General Questions forum in Discussions. This way all students can benefit from the answers. On Monday through Friday, I will respond to questions starting at 2pm. On Saturday and Sunday, I will reply within 24-48 hours. Students are encouraged to respond to questions when they know the answers. You are always welcome to send me an email if you prefer.

2. Attendance

Attendance is essential to your success as an online student. You will be considered present if you demonstrate active participation in the class through weekly Discussion Boards, quizzes, tests and submitting the Art Review and Self-portrait assignments. On the contrary, you will be marked absent if you do not actively participate in these academic activities, and dropped from the course if you

miss more than 1 week of assignments without any communication to me.

3. Drop Policy

I am not able to drop you. Students may drop the class by April 2 without any penalty reflected on their transcript. **Note: Student-initiated drops are permitted after this date, but the student is not guaranteed a grade of W. The faculty member of record will issue a grade of either W or F.

4. Late Work



Final Grade Evaluation

1. Discussions 20%

The discussions are our main meeting places for communication and exchange of ideas. In summary, you will respond to four discussion boards, most will be with a response and 2 replies during the course. You will also post your Art Review and Self-Portrait Videos to the Discussion Board and they will be included in the Discussion Board grade. See complete guidelines posted under “About Art 104.”

2. Tests 30%

You will have 4 tests for this class, that cover the textbook readings for each module. You will have two attempts to take each test but only the highest score will count towards your grade. There is no final exam for this class.

3. Quizzes 20%

You will have 4 quizzes for this class, that cover the supplementary material in each module. You will only have one attempt to take each quiz.

4. Art Review 15%

This is a two part assignment. First, visit a Museum of Art in your area. Select a work from a temporary exhibition or the permanent collection to review. Choose a artwork that you respond to. In your review, write a description of the work and include your reaction to it using appropriate terminology and your knowledge of the visual elements and principles of art. Papers must be at least 650 words and you must attach proof that you went to an

art museum. Download the pdf description in Assignments for the full list of requirements. Second, record a short video of yourself in front of the art work if possible or inside the venue. In your video, please tell us where you are and what artwork you are reviewing. Tell us briefly why you chose this artwork. Please keep your videos very brief 60 seconds is enough. Post your video to the Art Review forum on the Discussion Board by Sunday, February 22. Post essays to the Art Review Assignment by Sunday, March 1.

5. Self Portrait 15%

This is a three part assignment. This creative project may be interpreted loosely but it must be created in any non-digital media. First, create a Self-portrait in any non-digital media or format that can be easily viewed on Canvas. Upload at least 3 images that show your work in progress from beginning, middle and end of you creating your Self-portrait. Second, write a 1-2 page creative statement that explains your self-portrait. Read the Self-portrait pdf in Assignments for a full list of instructions. Third, take a short video of yourself while creating your Self-portrait or near the end. Tell us your inspiration for how you created your Self-portrait. Please keep your videos very brief 60 seconds is enough. Post Self-portraits with your Artist Statement in the Assignments folder and post your video to the Self-portrait forum on the Discussion Board by Sunday, April 26.

Regular and Substantive Interaction

I look forward to working closely with you this semester, and you can expect me to play an active role in our class. I will post announcements every week, and provide detailed feedback on major assignments within one week of submission. I will also answer questions throughout the semester in the Q&A Discussion and via email, usually within 24 hours M-F. Please let me know when you need help—that’s why I’m here!

Netiquette

1. Respect

Respect the rich and diverse identities, perspectives, and experiences of our class. Please help me develop this environment by honoring the diverse identities of your classmates and letting me know (via private message) if an assignment, comment, etc. makes you feel uncomfortable.

2. Participate

Participate by reading the posts of your classmates. Share your ideas to strengthen our discussion, and don’t wait until the last minute to contribute. Encourage others to participate by responding to their ideas. Be involved, but do not dominate a discussion with too many posts.

3. Remember

Remember the human. Even though we may not be face to face, there is a real person behind each discussion post. Do not write something that you would not feel comfortable saying in an in-person class-

room setting. Discuss ideas, not people. In other words, do not attack classmates for expressing their opinions; instead, discuss your position on the ideas that have been presented. Be kind and understanding with your classmates to keep our environment positive and productive. Everything we do in Canvas is permanent, so please think very carefully about your tone before submitting a post. If you don’t, that mistake might haunt you for the rest of the semester.

4. Help

Help others. We will be working together all semester, so let’s make the best of it. If you can help a classmate with a question, please do! Your efforts will be appreciated.

5. Edit

Edit and proofread before posting. We have lots of posts to read, so please review and edit what you have written before posting.


