INSTRUCTOR INTRODUCTION

Marianna Olague holds an MFA in Painting from Cranbrook Academy of Art in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. She received her BA in Drawing from UTEP. Olague has exhibited in museums and galleries across the United States, including Los Angeles, New York, Chicago, and Washington, DC. Her work is included in numerous private and public collections, notably the El Paso Museum of Art and Cranbrook Art Museum. Olague's painting, *Customer Service Representative, 2020*, was included in the *Outwin 2022, American Portraiture Today* exhibition, which opened at the Smithsonian Museum's National Portrait Gallery and traveled through 2024. Olague recently served as the inaugural Artist-in-Residence at the El Paso Mexican American Cultural Center in 2025. She was also awarded a Chinati Foundation Residency in Marfa, TX, in 2021. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Advanced Drawing V continues the exploration of traditional and non-traditional drawing media, techniques, and presentation, along with the development of personal imagery. As the fourth course in a sequence for Drawing majors and minors, students will be expected to continue developing personal imagery through the exploration of a focused theme and through effective critiquing skills with further study of the drawing discipline. Students enrolling in this course are expected to be committed to exploring the possibilities offered within the drawing discipline and are willing to invest the necessary time, effort, and attention to meet these goals.

To successfully complete the quantity and quality of drawings expected for this course, students should expect to devote a minimum of six hours of work per week, outside of class, in addition to our in-class studio time. The hours outside of class should be spent obtaining drawing supplies, doing prep work and research, sketching, and working on drawings for your portfolio.

Course grades will be based on two portfolios of work and writing assignments designed to acquaint students with well-known artists, developments in contemporary art and drawing, and their artistic practice. Students will keep a sketchbook as a tool for developing images and concepts. Slide lectures will be presented to provide examples, ideas, and influences. Critiques will be held for comparative evaluation and critical feedback regarding in-progress and finished work. Your work and participation are required at each critique.

COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Students in DRAW 3338 can expect to achieve greater technical proficiency with a wide range of drawing media and gain experience with nontraditional drawing materials and methods. They will also have the opportunity to expand their knowledge of artists, ideas, and issues relevant to contemporary art and drawing. Students will continue developing the ability to speak and think critically about art images and issues and should begin to situate their work within the field of contemporary art, in general, and, in particular, contemporary drawing. They will be expected to continue developing their personal imagery with a more focused approach than in previous advanced drawing classes.

COURSE OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this course can expect to:

- show exploration, experimentation, and development in both the form and content of their work.
- have gained experience and understanding of various technical, material, and conceptual approaches to image making available in contemporary drawing.
- have developed a more extensive knowledge of contemporary and historical artists and issues relevant to the drawing discipline.
- have improved their critical skills relevant to the discussion and analysis of artworks.
- have made advances in focusing the scope and direction of their own personal imagery and be able to place their work within the context of the contemporary drawing field.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Two portfolios will be reviewed and graded during the semester. The number of drawings required for each portfolio must demonstrate 6-7 weeks' worth of work (depending on the class schedule) and at least 12 hours of work (in and out of class) per week. You will also use Blackboard to submit your writing assignments and images of your completed portfolios for review and grading. Students are responsible for keeping me up to date with drawings they are working on outside of class. I won't accept portfolios containing work done exclusively outside of class unless I have seen evidence of the work in progress. The first portfolio will be due around the midterm, and the second portfolio will be due the last week of classes. Writing assignments will be due every 3-4 weeks throughout the semester.

As mentioned, each portfolio must be submitted on Blackboard. To do this, please compile high-resolution images of your work into a single PDF for easy viewing. One image per drawing is required, though additional images are welcome. Even if I have seen your work in class and during critiques, it must still be uploaded to Blackboard by the deadline for grading. When photographing your artwork, make sure the visible edges of the paper or piece are included, and photograph your work against a white background only.

COURSE EVALUATION AND GRADING

Individual drawings will not be graded. Instead, portfolios will be graded on the overall quality and quantity of work completed, as well as on progress made with content and execution.

Your portfolio grades will be based on:

1. Aesthetic/visual strength of your work: visual interest, drawing skills, compositional decisions, choice and use of materials, etc.
2. Conceptual strength of the work: originality, creativity, self-reliance, awareness of contemporary art issues.
3. Degree of growth, effort, experimentation, and ambition.

4. Thoroughness of execution to include use of materials, craftsmanship, and presentation.
5. Artist Statement.
6. Amount of work completed.
7. Completion of work on time.
8. Presentation of ideas, sources, and influences through sketchbook work and research.
9. Work ethic in class. Includes the amount of time devoted to drawing, staying off your phone, class conduct, and being prepared with materials and ideas.
10. Critique participation*

*Participation means arriving prepared and on time for critiques, staying attentive (like staying off your phone), and contributing insightful comments to the conversation.

Along with two portfolios, several writing assignments will be given during the semester. Details for each writing assignment will be provided on Blackboard and graded on an A, B, C, D, F scale.

Course Grading:

Midterm Portfolio 40%

Final Portfolio 40%

Writing Assignments 20% combined

Late portfolio and writing submissions on Blackboard will incur a penalty of -20 points each day the work is late. If you miss the midterm critique or the final critique, -50 points will be removed from the final grade for each day the student is missing from the critique. Adjustments to the final grade will be made, if necessary, to reflect the student's attendance record. Plagiarism and/or cheating will result in a failing grade for this course and disciplinary action.

A: 90-100%, B: 80-89%, C: 70-79%, D: 60-69%, and F: Below 60%.

COURSE POLICIES

It is the student's responsibility to fulfill all class requirements to the best of their ability. If a student is unclear about any aspect of the syllabus, they should seek clarification from the instructor.

You are being graded not just on the work submitted in your portfolio, but also on your work ethic in class. Therefore, your regular attendance is required, and you must be prepared with ideas and materials for each class. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of every class. It is impossible to make up information presented in slide lectures, critiques, demonstrations, and other class activities, so it is essential that you attend every class, arrive on time, and stay until the end.

- Students are allowed 3 unexcused absences during the semester without penalty. If you are absent, it is your responsibility to notify me. Please contact me via email ASAP to obtain any pertinent information you may have missed.
- After 3 unexcused absences, your final course grade will be lowered one letter grade per additional absence. For example, a final grade of "A" becomes a "B" with 4 absences, a "C" with 5 absences, a "D" with 6 absences, and so on. Students with more than 5 unexcused absences should consider dropping the course and retaking it when they can commit proper attention.
- Absences may be excused with proper notification for documented serious illness, death in the immediate family, or university-sanctioned events.
- Scheduled appointments, transportation problems, and job demands are not excused absences.
- It should be noted that accumulating 6 or more absences, regardless of whether your absences

are excused or unexcused, is still considered excessive and may result in you receiving a “D” or “F” in the course. At this point, you have missed valuable class and lecture time, and I can’t justify giving you a higher grade. Dropping or retaking the course may be the best option for you.

- Excessive tardies can also affect your grade in the course. Arriving to class late (after roll is taken), leaving early, or being late from break – all count as tardy.
- How much your tardies affect your grade will be up to the instructor, but accumulating excessive tardies is equivalent to being absent, as you are consistently missing valuable class time. Being late to every class, or every other class, can mean the difference between an “A” and a “B”.
- Coming to class without the necessary materials or not working while attending class is also considered absent.

- In addition to requiring your attention during critiques, you must also be on time for each critique session. If you are late, it may result in you not being able to critique that day and/or receiving a reduced grade on the assignment. This policy also applies if you are seen using your phone during the critique.
- Absolutely no texting or social media during class time. If a student is found violating this policy, a verbal warning will be given at first; if found violating the policy a second time, a ½ absence will be recorded for the day.
- Do not stream video content while working, either, as it can be distracting to you and those around you.
- Music is not allowed during any instruction, lecture, or critique, but students may listen to music while working/drawing. The music should be played at a low volume with headphones (preferably one earbud only) so as not to disturb other students.

- No food is allowed in the drawing studio.
- Students are allowed one 15-minute break per class session at the halfway point. Everyone must take their break at the same time.
- Help keep the drawing studio clean by cleaning up after yourself at the end of each class session.

ILLNESS PRECAUTIONS

Please stay home if you have symptoms of a communicable illness. If you are feeling unwell, please notify me as soon as possible so that we can make appropriate accommodations.

It is the student's sole responsibility to catch up on information missed during an absence. When absent, a student must stay current with missed work and assignments and stay in contact with the instructor regarding health status, recovery, and anticipated return to class. COURSE DROP POLICY

I will not drop you from the course. However, if you feel that you are unable to complete the course successfully, please let me know and then contact the [Registrar's Office](#) to initiate the drop process. If you do not, you are at risk of receiving an “F” for the course.

Do not submit work under your name that you did not do yourself. In addition, you may not submit work for this class that you completed for another class.

GUIDANCE ON ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Use of AI technologies or automated tools, particularly AI art generators, is only allowed with approval from the instructor BEFORE being used. Without permission, you will be expected to think creatively and critically to complete assignments without assistance from these tools.

With permission, the AI art generator can be used for inspiration during the brainstorming stages of an art project, and for occasional reference, but may not be used solely on its own, or repeatedly, to generate your artwork throughout the semester. Keep in mind that AI-generated ideas are not your own and may hinder your ability to think critically and creatively about a problem. Use sparingly, and if given permission to use any of these tools, students must properly cite and give full credit to the program used upon submission of the assignment and during critiques with their classmates.

COURSE SUPPLIES

Students should have a portfolio or a sturdy tube large enough to hold their work without folding or bending it. It is strongly recommended that each student have a variety of black, white, and colored drawing materials, along with an assortment of papers for experimentation. Other materials to bring to class include scissors, rulers, an X-acto knife, adhesives, masking tape, erasers, and more. Each student must have their own set of materials; borrowing from others is not allowed. Appropriate materials are required at each class session. Drawings done on basic drawing pad sheets or on newsprint are not acceptable for finished work, and their use will affect your portfolio grade. Additionally, you should always have a sketchbook with you for every class.

Art supplies can be bought at Hobby Lobby, Michaels, Dick Blick (dickblick.com), or Art Center & Signs (show your ID for a discount). Other online art stores include Utrecht Art Supplies (utrechtart.com) and Jerry's Artarama (jerrysartarama.com). For online paper sources, look to Acuity Papers (acuitypapers.com), including Hiromi Paper (hiromipaper.com), Legion Paper (legionpaper.com), Takach Paper (takachpaper.com), and Washi Arts (washiart.com). Dick Blick is also a good place to purchase paper.
