The College of Liberal Arts proposes two new minors: Interdisciplinary Minor; and Multicultural Society Minor; Community.

I. Interdisciplinary Minor

The Interdisciplinary Minor (IM) allows students to combine insights, methodologies, and courses from multiple academic disciplines, spanning across traditional academic boundaries. It fulfills the goals of any other minor, complements a major and increases exposure to other disciplines. The IM provides students with a well-rounded education that goes beyond the confines of a single major, fostering critical thinking, problemsolving skills, and the ability to connect ideas and concepts from diverse areas of study; thus, designated field courses in the IM contribute to solidify a liberal arts foundation.¹

The IM allows students to individualize, broaden, and expand their learning experience by tailoring their degree plan to their interests, to their commitment to social responsibilities, and to their career goals. It does not create new courses, but it capitalizes on courses offered by various departments, and whose high-quality content and academic rigor have been verified through our institution-credentialing process. The flexibility of the IM facilitates setting pathways towards graduation for students who have already acquired an interdisciplinary education through earned credit hours in multiple fields. In particular, students switching degree programs or concentrations may benefit from declaring an IM, thereby avoiding the loss of credit hours that might otherwise persuade them to desist from completing a Bachelor's degree program.

In addition to a change of programs across departments, loss of credit hours happens before even declaring a major and minor due to limited credit transferability between institutions, or lack of applicability of transferred credit hours towards the degree plan elected. The IM will contribute to address equity, inclusion, and retention issues related to loss or unused credits resulting from transference from other institutions. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board reported in 2021 that "…on average, 2020 Texas bachelor's graduates who started at the same institution where they graduated had three excess hours, and those who transferred had 21."² Transferred students from community colleges are usually low-income students and a change of major may place them at risk of acquiring or increasing their debt due to the cost of finishing their new minor.³

In the last two years, of a total of 2,497 UTEP Liberal Arts graduates:

377 students transferred 25-49 credit hours;

895 students transferred 50-69 credit hours;

431 students transferred 70-186 credit hours from other institutions.

At the time of their graduation, adding to their transfer credits, 974 students had accrued 130-149 credit hours, and 461 earned 150-261 credit hours.

363 of them were non-transfer students; however, 234 students from this group graduated with 125-206 credit hours, exceeding the **120 credit hours** most bachelor's degrees required.⁴ While these numbers reflect a national problem that requires complex measures to reduce the actual cost of higher education and time-to-degree rates, the IM expands opportunities for social mobility through the attainment of a Baccalaureate degree with the most efficient use of transferred or earned credit hours. It aligns with UTEP's mission of "increasing access to excellence in higher education and positively impact the health, culture, education, and economy of the community we serve." ⁵ Furthermore, it supports UTEP's commitment to inclusivity, building on student

strengths, demonstrating a culture of care through a concerted effort to raise the number of degrees awarded, total enrollment, and retention rate,⁶ as well as the College of Liberal Arts' consideration of "first-generation and low-income students as assets and not liabilities."⁷

In sum, the IM offers the educational benefits of an interdisciplinary education and maximizes the use of credits that are not being utilized in a traditional major or minor (whether through transfer credit, change of major, inability to pass a certification exam, or prerequisites).

Requirements:

The coordinator of the program must approve the student request to declare this minor. A detailed assessment of the student's degree program will take place to determine if the interdisciplinary minor is the best fit for the student's goals and interests, and will not postpone or hinder their graduation. Courses taken for this major must be in an academic field different from their major.

18 hours of elective courses from at least two disciplines with a minimum of 12 hours of upper division coursework, approved by the coordinator of the program.

II. <u>Multicultural Society Minor</u>

The Multicultural Society Minor (MSN) is designed to provide students with a critical understanding of historical and contemporary issues, addressing the intersections of race and ethnicity with class, gender, and other forms of difference and hierarchy across various social groups. As is true of other minors, it complements a major and allows exploration of other disciplines. The MSN contributes to the decompartmentalization of knowledge about specific social groups, recognizing the interconnectedness of historical experiences in regional, transnational, transborder, and global contexts, as well as the social, political and economic implications of multicultural processes. The MSN does not create new courses to meet its academic goals, but integrates credit hours earned in various departments across the university and whose content fosters a multicultural approach. Courses counting towards the MSN explore displacement of communities,

cultural appropriations and representations, hybridism, intra-ethnic differences, imperialism, colonized societies, enslavement, bilingualism, ethnogenesis, resilience, discursive constructions of racism, and inter-ethnic solidarities, among other topics.

Requirements:

Student must obtain approval of the coordinator of the program before declaring this minor. The coordinator will determine if the minor is the best fit for the student's goals and interests, and will not postpone or hinder their graduation.

Up to 3 hours can be double-fulfilled with a core or major course. Additional hours may be required to reach the 120 minimum needed for graduation.

I. Need

A. Job market need

The Multicultural Society Minor (MSN) is designed to provide students with a critical understanding of historical and contemporary issues, addressing the intersections of race and ethnicity with class, gender, and other forms of difference and hierarchy across various social groups. As is true of other minors, it complements a major and allows exploration of other disciplines. The MSN contributes to the decompartmentalization of knowledge about specific social groups, recognizing the interconnectedness of historical experiences in regional, transnational, transborder, and global contexts, as well as the social, political and economic implications of multicultural processes. The MSN does not create new courses to meet its academic goals, but integrates credit hours earned in various departments across the university and whose content fosters a multicultural approach. Courses counting towards the MSN explore displacement of communities, cultural appropriations and representations, hybridism, intra-ethnic differences, imperialism, colonized societies, enslavement, bilingualism, resilience, discursive constructions of racism, and inter-ethnic solidarities, among other topics.

Minor Information

I. Need

A. Job market need

Students with a multicultural society minor gain competences highly valuable in labor sectors that require interaction with diverse populations, such as healthcare, education, international business/multicultural marketing, and social services. A Multicultural Society minor shows that a candidate is committed to diversity initiatives and can contribute to creating inclusive environments. The strong interpersonal skills a multicultural society minor develops, including critical thinking, active listening and effective communication, are essential for working in cross-cultural teams and building relationships with clients and colleagues from different backgrounds. Employers increasingly prioritize diversity and inclusion in their workplaces, seeking conflict resolution specialists who can navigate cultural differences. A search in *Indeed*, a job seeking engine, produced 1298 hiring posts in Texas on October 14, 2023 when keying-in the term "multicultural". The wide variety of positions advertised expressly required multicultural competences that can be acquired through a MS minor.¹

B. Student demand

While an MS minor provides skills that increase competitivity in the job market, students value courses that allow them to build a critical affirmation of their own cultural background, history and social place.² Early advocates of multiculturalist pedagogies, McGee Banks and Banks believed "education within a pluralistic society should help students to gain the content, attitudes, and skills needed to know reflectively, to care deeply, and to act thoughtfully." ³ Youth engagement in issues of inequality demonstrates a

sustained interest in the transformation of social environments which gave origin to ethnic studies programs and is now expanding into multicultural studies programs.⁴ The recognition of historical inter and intra-ethnic differences producing substantial social disparities prompts students to enroll in courses that recognize complex race, gender, and religious relations and resonate with Stein's approach to multiculturalism:

"Because difference shapes individuals' particular positioning within collective political interventions, we each must take account of (and be accountable for) our specific locations within modern matrices of power and, at the same time, be answerable to the fact of our entanglement."⁵

An awareness of the importance of a global citizenship education, which may also stem from UTEP students interest in learning about their own multicultural background, makes this minor culturally relevant to a diverse student body.⁶ Students seeking comprehensive examinations of multicultural societies will find the MS minor significant, as the following statement by a UTEP student confirms:

"Given my profound interest in understanding diverse communities, ethnicities, and cultures, I believe that a multicultural studies minor would help students like me gain a comprehensive insight into the intricacies of various societies and their distinctive behaviors. Additionally, being able to learn about different cultures without having to strictly focus on just one would allow for a more holistic approach to cultural understanding that may be beneficial to various careers both inside and outside of the liberal arts. I would love to see something like this happen here at UTEP..."⁷






