Proposal Title: Theatre Practicum Correction

The titles for our Theatre Practicum courses make it difficult for students to register for the correct section. This proposal corrects this by giving unique course titles to each section that directly relates to the subject matter of each section.

Instead of registering for Practicum I, II, or III in the section offered by the faculty member in charge of a specific studio, students register for either: THEA 2110 (Scenery), THEA 2111 (Costume), THEA 2112 (Lighting), THEA 2113 (Box Office), or THEA 2114 (Dinner Theatre). This reduces extra work and red-tape for advisors by allowing the system to keep track of how many time as student has taken practicum in a specific studio. It also makes it easier on the advising faculty letting each studio set the cap for their own section.

The old course titles (Practicum 1-6) will be deleted after students using old degree plans have graduated.

The sample syllabus provided will act as a template for the other courses. The other courses syllabi will have minor changes regarding room number, instructor of record, and specific lab requirements/safety rules.

Email is the best way to get a hold of me. I check my email very frequently and will get back to you as soon as I can. During the week I will respond to all questions within 24 hours. However, if you email me on the weekend or over a school holiday don't be surprised if I don't get back to you until Monday morning.

Course Goals:

- The purpose of this course is to give each student the opportunity to learn skills needed for the technical and support areas of play production.
- To give students an understanding of the work necessary to put a production together.

Learning Outcomes:

- Students will learn and then apply basic technical skill in the shop they are working, whether it be in the area of scenery, costumes, lights or front of house.
- Students will begin to understand the collaboration that happens with the production team.
- Students will develop the time management skills which will help them in their growth within the program.
- Students will evaluate their work ethics and commitment to the craft they are studying.

Required Materials:

- Tennis shoes (that you don't mind getting dirty)
- Pants (jeans that you can get paint on)
- A hair tie if your hair is longer than your shoulders
- A small bin with a lid that is large enough to put all of these items in

Requirements:

Each student is required to do a total of 75 hours. These hours may be a combination of lab hours, crew hours, show hours, or papers.

Lab hours:	1 hour = 1 point (up to 65 points allowed)		
Crew hours:	(3 points per day)

Polices:

- It is the student's responsibility to record their hours. Unrecorded hours will not count towards your total hours.
- It is each student's responsibility to dress properly for the work place, follow instructions, ask questions if something is not understood, comply with rules and regulations of the area, and participate in daily clean up.
- It is the responsibility of the student to fulfill all the requirements to the best of her/his abilities. If a student is unclear about anything on the syllabus, s/he should seek clarification from the instructor.
- Work must be done in minimum two hour blocks.
- Once you have set your schedule there will be no rescheduling.
- If you cannot make your scheduled time on a given day please notify your supervisor ahead of time to reschedule a time later that week.
- Consistent attendance is mandatory for crew assignments. Absences will not be tolerated for running crew. No partial crew work is acceptable. Failure to meet these requirements will result in a failing grade.
- You will be asked to provide a schedule of times (attached) that you are available for work in the shop.
- Students must behave in accordance with all rules put forth by the Handbook of Operating Procedures of the University of Texas at El Paso
- Any student who, because of a disabling condition, requires special arrangements to meet course requirements should contact the instructor in person as soon as possible. Lab hours:

You will be asked to provide a schedule of times (attached) that you are available for work in the shop. Work must be done in minimum two hour blocks. Once you have set your schedule there will be no rescheduling. If you cannot make your scheduled time on a given day please notify your supervisor ahead of time to reschedule a time later that week.

Please arrive to your lab hours wearing closed-toed shoes and clothes that you do not mind getting dirty. If you are wearing unsuitable clothes you will be asked to change or be sent home.

Crew Hours:

If you decide to work on a running crew for your area, and you complete the crew work satisfactorily, you will receive hours as credit based on the number of scheduled rehearsal & performance dates. Crews are limited in number and you must commit to every date /time listed for that production. <u>No partial crew work is acceptable</u>. Failure to meet these requirements will result in a failing grade for the class.

Wardrobe crew consists of attending crew watch, all dress rehearsals, and all performances of a given show. A crew member's duties include washing and ironing laundry for the show, checking costume items in and out for every show, helping the actors get dressed & apply their make-up, and running quick changes. Attached to the syllabus is a calendar which includes the dates for each show. The call times are variable and are subject to change by the stage manager of that production. The average call time for evening performances and most rehearsals is 6pm to 11pm. For matinee performances the average call time is 9am to 1 pm (for all matinee performances students will receive a letter excusing them from their classes). Consistent attendance is mandatory for crew assignments. Absences will not be tolerated for running crew no partial credit will be given. Running a show is a commitment to the actors, crew, designers, audience and the rest of the theatre department will be depending on you!!!

Please not that 3 points per day is an approximation of average hours spent, not a direct hour-to-point ratio. Shows vary widely in run-time and the length of rehearsals. Students are encouraged to do their pre and post show tasks in an expeditious manner.

Show Papers:

Students are encouraged to see the shows that they have helped produce over the course of the semester. As such each student has the opportunity to see these productions and write a reflection paper on them for credit. Up to 3 shows are allowed to be used for credit. These papers should be 2-3 pages on the costume elements of each show, answering the following questions:

- 1. What items that you or other students from your class worked on were in the show? How were these items used and what was their effect in the audience? If you are watching a show that you did not work on, comment on items that were similar to those you worked on for another production.
- 2. Do the costumes define the time period and/or location of the production? If so, how and do you think this helped the audience understand the play?
- 3. What colors/color range was used for the costumes in the play? How did these compare to the colors used in the set and lights?
- 4. Were different colors used for different characters or groups of characters? How did this affect your perception of those characters?
- 5. Where there any special effects or quick changes in the costumes, hair, and/or make-up? What were they and how do you think they might have been executed?

The paper is due at the week after the show closes. You may turn in your paper to the instructor for the shop in which you are doing hours, either in-person, or by email. Students are strongly encouraged to sign up on the sign-in sheet in the lobby. You will also be required to save your ticket stub/play bill and staple it to the first page of your paper. Students who work as crew on a show for the Theatre & Dance Department are allowed to write a paper on their back-stage experience and should give me the name of their faculty supervisor as a contact point rather than attaching a ticket stub. Students performed in a show for the Theatre & Dance Department are allowed to write a paper on their experience and should give me the name of the director as a contact point rather than attaching a ticket stub.

While students are encouraged to see shows produced by the Theatre & Dance Department to see their work on stage, I understand that there may be barriers to this. As such, students are permitted to see any live theatrical production during the course of the semester, so long as the student retains the original ticket stub/play bill and staples it to their paper.

Final Paper:

Students are asked to write a final paper to demonstrate that they have successfully reached the Course Objectives as stated in the syllabus, which are:

- Learn skills needed for the technical and support areas of play production.
- Understand the work necessary to put a production together.

In order to do this a student has the opportunity to write a 2-3 page paper answering the following questions:

- 1. What new skills did you learn while completing your shop hours?
- 2. What skills did you improve while completing your shop hours?
- 3. How did the work that you performed during your shop hours affect this semester's productions?
- 4. How would these productions be different if you had not contributed?
- 5. How might some of the tasks affect future productions?

The final paper must be 2-3 typed pages double spaced with 1" margins. The paper is due no later than 5pm on the last day of class (Thursday before finals week). You may email the paper to me. No late work will be accepted!!!!
