Proposal Title: Musical Theatre BFA Reform

The Musical Theatre Concentration is a Theatre BFA that continues to gain popularity and relevance in our department. At present, however, we are not getting enough time working the craft of musical theatre with these students.

The proposed changes address this by giving students 8 semesters of Musical Theatre Studio training combined with 8 semesters of voice training.

Students on the previous BFA Musical Theatre concentration will still be able to fulfill their degree requirements by taking a combined 6 semesters of THEA 3126, Musical Theatre Studio to sub for the former requirement of Musical Theatre Workshop I, II, and III.

Required Text/Materials:

Musical Theatre Workshop (MTW) is an exploration of the American Musical Theatre.

Students study the work of the actor/singer/dancer, director and choreographer and use their gained knowledge to develop as performers. Students prepare and present material as soloists; as members of small groups and/or larger ensembles.

The Workshop format requires students to prepare material for class presentation and critique. There will also be a focus on the audition process as well as musical theatre history, pedagogy and repertoire. Each student must master two songs and one monologue to add to their "book" and complete a scene study of a musical theatre scene/musical number.

Course Objectives

- to strengthen vocal ability, improve musicianship and hone and integrate acting skills
- to enlarge the performer's musical theatre repertory
- to reinforce the connection between text/musical analysis and performance
- to develop techniques for auditioning and performing
- to provide the performer with tools and techniques to aid in their own learning
- to assess strengths and weaknesses in performance and propose solutions for improvement
- to further the performer's understanding of musical theatre history and tradition
- to provide a foundation for further study and development

Choosing Music: Please be objective when choosing your solos. Choose music that represents you/your voice well - not merely a song "I really love". You must also choose pieces that complement and

complete your book. Please see the handout, "Build Your Own Book" on Blackboard.

Choosing a Monologue: Much like your solo choose material that challenges you and helps us see your quality and abilities as an actor/storyteller.

Choose a style you have not yet done

- our goal is a minimum of two classical and two contemporary pieces in your book. See, "The Monologue Hunt" on Blackboard.

Dress for Success: You must be dressed to move for every class period, as we will be incorporating more movement into the workshop. Comfortable clothes (not too loose) and dance shoes (no rubber soles). Jazz or ballet shoes are best.

Final Project: You must present one of your current solos, as well as your monologue and scene from the semester.
