V. New Business

- Department of Political Science and Public Administration
 - Creation of a Bachelor's of Public Administration
 - Discussion led by Eric Boyer and Genna Gaspare
 - A bachelor's degree in public administration is vital for the Paso del Norte region (El Paso, Las Cruces, and Ciudad Juárez), preparing graduates with skills in management, budgeting, decision-making, and public service. With over 12,000 public administration jobs and nearly 18,600 nonprofit roles in El Paso County alone, the program supports strong local demand. Graduates will be well equipped for roles in government, nonprofits, and binational institutions, helping strengthen regional capacity to serve diverse communities.

 - Undergraduate curriculum change approved as submitted
- Department of English
 - Change to BA degree plan, course title, and description, and additions to Humanities block elective offerings.
 - Discussion led by Joe Ortiz
 - The change to the BA English degree plan will add select graduate courses to elective options and enable students to take Fast Track eligible courses within degree plan before they begin their student teaching requirement. The revised course title and description for ENGL 3349 will better match the content of the course, which has changed dramatically with the emergence of digital writing and networked literacies.

- Department of Criminal Justice and Security Studies
 - o Restriction on CRIJ 3313 Criminology
 - Discussion led by Stacie Ordonez
 - Currently, freshmen and sophomores are allowed to take this junior level class.
 The department would like only juniors and seniors to register for this class.
 Therefore, the department is asking for the following restriction to be placed:
 Must be enrolled in one of the following classifications: Junior and Senior.

- Department of Criminal Justice and Security Studies
 - o Restrictions for CRIJ 4309
 - Discussion led by Stacie Ordonez
 - The internship course is designed as a capstone experience where students apply academic knowledge in professional settings.

 - o Undergraduate curriculum change approved as submitted

- Department of Criminal Justice and Security Studies
 - o Restrictions for INSS 4366
 - Discussion led by Stacie Ordonez
 - Students must complete INSS 3302 before enrolling in INSS 4366 to ensure they have the necessary foundation in intelligence concepts and analytical skills.
 - o Motion: Unanimous consent
 - Undergraduate curriculum change approved as submitted
- Department of Criminal Justice and Security Studies
 - Fast-Track Program Between the BA- Security Studies and Master of Defense and Strategic Studies
 - Discussion led by
 - There is room to increase recruitment in the Bachelor of Security Studies and Masters of Defense and Strategic Studies programs through the creation of a fast-track path between these two 100% online degrees. This will offer an attractive, expedited path for talented undergraduate students to be able to complete a master's degree in the Security Studies field.
 - Motion: Unanimous consent to table this proposal for the next meeting, as the presenter was absent.
- Department of Psychology
 - Adding From Molecules to Behavior and Introduction to Cognitive Neuroscience
 - Discussion led by Ana Schwartz
 - Molecules to Behavior and Introduction to Cognitive Neuroscience are advanced courses designed to fill key gaps in the neuroscience curriculum. Molecules to Behavior offers graduate and upper-division undergraduates exposure to the latest research in behavioral neuroscience through guest lectures by leading experts using innovative experimental methods. Introduction to Cognitive Neuroscience is the only course focused specifically on human cognitive processes, complementing existing offerings in behavioral neuroscience and addiction studies.

 - Undergraduate curriculum change approved as submitted
- Department of Psychology
 - PSYC UG Removing Prereq for PSYC 4324
 - Discussion led by Ana Schwartz
 - This course is designed to be appropirate for majors outside of psychology such as Neuroscience majors as well as others throughout the college and university. As a consequence the prerequisites are not appropriate and is preventing students from other majors from enrolling in the course.
 - Motion: Unanimous consent with a friendly amendment to edit the Rationale Section of the proposal. The letter "g" is missing, as stated, "prerequisite is not appropriate and is preventin students".

- Department of Psychology
 - Add PSYC 4324 as block elective
 - Discussion led by Ana Schwartz
 - Currently psychology offers 3 block electives, each representing a different subdiscipline in psychology, each corresponding to different areas within the Psychology Department (cognitive psychology, legal psychology and health psychology). Currently there is not a block elective representing the subdiscipline of psychobiology. Not only is this a key subdiscipline within psychology, it is an area within the Psychology Department.

This proposal also takes into consideration faculty teaching load.
