NEW COEPA EVALUATION RUBRIC

The UTEP School of Pharmacy has implemented the below EPA evaluation rubric which reflects the new **AACP-Curricular Outcomes and Entrustable Professional Activities** (**COEPA, pronounced COPA**) standards. As you complete Student Evaluations in the coming weeks, you will utilize this rubric to assess the level of "Entrustment" for each EPA completed by the student.

Levels of Expectancy*:	Observe Only	Direct Supervision	Reactive Supervision	Intermittent Supervision	General Direction
Description	Learner is permitted to observe only. Even with direct supervision, learner is not entrusted to perform the activity or task.	Learner is entrusted to perform the activity or task with direct and proactive supervision. Learner must be observed performing tasks in order to provide immediate feedback.	Learner is entrusted to perform the activity or task with indirect and reactive supervision.	Learner is entrusted to perform the activity or task with supervision at a distance. Learner can independently perform task.	Learner is entrusted to independently decide what activities and tasks need to be performed. Learner entrusted to direct and supervise activities of others.

Entrustment Scale Progression					•

Reasons for proposing a new scale of entrustment:

- Ensure EPA assessments are **based on the level of trust** that a pharmacist observer has for a student completing a task **rather than a numeric value or grade**
- AACP recommends that assessments of the entrustment level focus on the description of supervision versus the numeric level as previously adopted
- The performance expectation within pharmacy programs should range from **observation only** (occurs through <u>preceptor modeling</u>), to **direct supervision** (<u>proactive supervision</u> occurs through student doing EPAs with the preceptor), to **indirect supervision** (<u>reactive supervision</u>) during the scope of the PharmD program



COMPLETING NEW CORE ELMS EVALUATIONS

As you attempt to complete the new CORE Elms IPPE and APPE evaluation, please review the suggested best practices below to ensure accurate completion of the evaluation. To assist you, we have also created this 2 minute video "**Completing Evaluations**" to guide you on how to best complete your Student Evaluation.

Step 1:

To start, please review the "**For Preceptors**" section of the evaluation to establish the minimum expectation students much achieve to receive a passing grade for this rotation. The minimum competency description provided in this section will be unique to each rotation type.



Step 2:

For each EPA select the activities completed by the student. Then based on the Rubric select at what level of Entrustability the student completed the activities selected. Repeat this process for each EPA on the evaluation.

Step 3:

At the end of the evaluation prior to selecting **PASS** or **FAIL** for the overall grade, click "**SAVE CHANGES**" to view the recommended evaluation outcome based on your evaluation selections. If the suggested outcome under "**ADJ**. **SCORE**" is consistent with your assessment, select **PASS** or **FAIL** for the Overall Grade and "**SUBMIT**" the evaluation. If not, please make your desired selection and provide an explanation in the "Question Comment" and the appropriate Clinical Coordinator will contact you to discuss.

Based on the student assessment on Entrustable Professional Activities (EPAs), the recommended final grade for the student would be: select either pass or fall.	Pass Fail

AACP Statement on Supreme Court Affirmative Action Ruling

"Dear AACP Members,

In light of the Supreme Court of the United States (SCOTUS) decision in two cases (Students for Fair Admissions v. Harvard and Students for Fair Admissions v. University of North Carolina), released on June 29, 2023, prohibiting the use of race in college admissions, the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy reaffirms our support for universities' admissions processes that are dedicated to diversity in health professions education and that allow universities the freedom to provide necessary academic content for their mission.

Our commitment to this work is reflected in these previously released position statements:

- <u>Joint Federation of the Associations of the Schools of the Health Professions (FASHP) Letter</u> <u>Supporting Academic Freedom</u>
- AACP's Commitment to Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Antiracism
- AACP Statement Related to Racism, Education and the Sept. 22, 2020, Executive Order

In addition, our <u>AACP Strategic Plan Priority #3: Leading Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Anti-racism (DEIA) Efforts</u>, and <u>AACP's Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) Initiatives</u> highlight our efforts to overcome systemic racism.

AACP is wholly committed to all efforts fostering diversity, equity, and inclusion, not only in pharmacy and pharmaceutical sciences education, but in all health professional education. We are deeply disappointed by the SCOTUS decisions to ignore the importance of these considerations for applicants; however, we remain dedicated to helping our members find ways to continue educating culturally competent health professionals within the boundaries defined by law.

As we move forward, AACP will begin holding virtual discussion sessions featuring experts from within and outside of academia to help our schools navigate this difficult and challenging transition. We will continue to support our members in the best way we can. Furthermore, we will continue to report on this discussion as it evolves over time."
